THE PACE THAT MAKES NO FRIENDS.

The Detroit News makes the downfall of ex-Police Commissioner Andrews the occasion for extending the following good advice:-

There is nothing splendid about the isolation in which Frank Andrews finds himself, now that the crash has come and his misfortunes and worse are known to the world. There is something infinitely pathetic in the fact that this man, who has been dealing in hundreds of thousands, should have been obliged to canvass practically the whole list of his business and personal acquaintances in this city to get bail in the sum of \$10,000, and should be finally forced to find his surety in Chicago. It is a sad commentary on his astounding career that, when the dark day came and he needed friends, he should discover that he had made none during his days of sudden and surprising succeas, and that the only men who even concerned themselves with the task of preventing his imprisonment awaiting trial were those who knew him in the humble days of his residence in Detroit. Homer Warren, to whose office he came fresh from the farm; Robert Murray, who knew him at that time, and John Beaumont, the latter Andrews' attorney, were also his office mates in the old days, before he had entered on his course of desperate

money hunting It is significant that the men of money who have been his later associates, who have been in large deals with him, who have backed many of his enterprises and profited by some of his lucky deals, had formed no attachment for this self-centred man whose soul was absorbed in the dollar chase. They had used him for their own ends, sometimes for the prosecution of enterprises so daringly speculative that they did not wish to impair their reputation for conservatism by being directly connected with them, but they were not there to risk a dollar on his bond or even to have it said that their relations with this man were close enough for them to help him in time of trouble.

These are facts which the young man ambitious for riches may well ponder. They may well make him pause and inquire: What is success? Will money repay a man for failure to gain the esteem, the confidence and affection of those with whom he is thrown into daily contact? Is that man successful who piles up dollars and forms no warm and lasting friendships? Suppose that Amalgamated had not slumped, that it had risen and that Andrews, instead of failing and becoming a criminal in his offorts to avert the crash, had gone on with his accumulations and had realized his ideal of retiring at the age of 40 with a few million dollars. What, save the sodden joy of possession or the physical comforts which wealth can purchase, would have comforted the years of his retirement? To live in a palace without friends must be a bitter and a barren triemph. Where was the gain to be?

### AMERICAN WAYS.

instead of a Spanish possession, to be seized among the speils of war. The Americans excuse the course they have taken by declaring that the Filipinos are not capable of governing themselves, but no one believes that they took the islands off the hands of the Spaniards at a valuation of many millions of dollars for the sake of the inhabitants, and everyone does believe that they were actuated solely by the expectation that the islands would prove of enormous commercial value to them.

They have been engaged for two years now in the pastime of shooting down these poor people, whose only desire is to be left to themselves. simply because they think that the possession of the islands will increase thear trade, and they have done this in the face of their pet rule of political faith, the Munroe doctine, which should certainly deter them from extending their territory into the Eastern Hemisphere, when it preaches that Eastern nations should be prevented from further occupation in the Western Hemisphere, even at the price of war, if necessary. When the most extravagant Boer claims are allowed, Great Britain's cause in South Africa is far more just than this unprovoked assault of the Americans on a semibarbarous people, whose country happened to rouse their avarice, and when the press of the United States has done its duty by its own country it will be time enough for it to turn its attention to the faults of other

#### THE LIBEL LAW.

The Ottawa Citizen, in an excellent article on this subject, says:-

The announcement that there are now eight newspaper men in the local legislature reminds us that it is about time the newspaper representatives in the house did something to amend the libel law to protect the press against the operations of legal harpies. The newspapers ask for no change in the scope of the law. If a Canadian newspaper does a man an injury or injustice it always stands ready to make reparation or take its medicine without squealing. It is very seldom that a wrong is done intentionally-it is usually accidental or, not infrequently the result of over-zealousness for the public interest. But under the present law any person can fire a writ at a newspaper without putting up any guarantee that if the newspaper wins the case its costs will be paid. This state of the law has given rise to two abuses. In nearly every community there are lawyers of no professional status, who sieze upon opportunities to work up libel actions on the part of financially irresponsible persons, banking on the fact that as the newspaper company knows it will not be able to recover its law costs when it wins it may be induced to pay what is really blackmail to settle the case, as being cheaper in the end and saving trouble. Most of the leading papers in Canada, however, have, on all occasions, fought these actions to a finish, and rather discouraged the business, though it comes high. Another class of persecution consists in certain interests which a newspaper may be opposing for public reasons backing a "straw man" in a bluff action in order to put the paper to financial loss in defending the suit. Of course the paper wins, but it cannot recover its costs from the "straw man" and is bled for several hundred dollars. This is a class of purely vindictive prostitution of the

The newspapers ask that any financially irresponsible person who prosecutes an action for libel should put up a guarantee for at least a portion of the costs, practically as a guarantee of good faith. The answer to any demand that an irresponsible plaintiff shall put up a guarantee for the costs has been that this may prevent a poor man who has actually suffered injury from securing justice. But the poor man seeking redress is quite a different proposition from the tool of the blackmailer or vindictive interests. The newspapers would be quite willing to have the right to demand security for costs made optional with the courts. Nine times out of ten the cause of action is a blackmailing of vindictive suit is so weak that no judge would hesitate to order that the newspapers costs should be guaranteed before it could be proceeded with. If the poor man has a sufficiently strong prima facie case to warrant the judge in refusing to order a guarantee of costs then the newspaper must perforce be content. But the fact of having to meet a motion for the guarantee of costs would prevent newspapers being dragged into court on frivolous causes of action and being heavily mulcted in costs for the privilege of demonstrating that they had never injured the individual.
