FEATURES OF THE BIG FAIR

Some Fine Exhibits Which Contributed to the Success of the Exhibition.

Enterprising Firms who Made Elaborate Displays—Who They Were.

Among the many fine exhibits at the Big Peninsular Fair The Planet noted the following:

THE MAPLE CITY CREAMERY.

The Maple City Creamery, which, while not among the oldest or largest, is one of the most successful industries in the Maple City, had a very creditable display in the main building at the Fair this year.

Mr. Lister, the proprietor of this establishment, was on the grounds himself and managed the exhibit. He had shown a good quantity of excellent creamery butter made in his factory, fresh from the churn, and also had a Babcock cream tester in operation, showing how the cream is tested in the factory and how the farmers are paid for it.

The creamery is doing an excellent business both at home and in outside and foreign points. A large market has been opened up in Scotland and the demand is so great that Mr. Lister is not able to send butter fast enough to supply the increasing demand. The butter is made in churnings of 424 pounds each, sometimes more and occasionally less, according to the quality of the cream.

Mr. Lister has paid for cream since the establishing of the factory \$30.956.85. In July last year \$1212.22 was paid for cream, while in the same month this year \$1338.96 was paid, so that the factory is not at a standstill but is growing. Farmers are finding out that it is far more profitable to them to sell their cream to the factory than to manufacture their own butter, and more of them are convinced of this fact every day and take advantage of the opportunity to make money.

One of the finest exhibitions at the Peninsular Fair this year, making its exception, was that of the Wm. Gray & Sons Co., Limited, carriage manufacturers. Their exhibit extended over half of the carriage building, and was the subject of much comment and admiration from the many visitors to the exhibition.

This firm, which was established in Chatham in 1855, enjoys a world wide reputation, and the fame of its silver carriages as a leading one in everything pertaining to beauty, durability and cheapness is certainly well deserved. They have agencies all over the civilized world, and every year they turn out over 10,000 buggies which are sold in every quarter of the universe. They also manufacture extensively sleighs, cutters, carts, etc.

The year they have carried off everything in the way of prizes at every exhibition at which they have shown their carriages, receiving first prizes at Ridgetown, Thamesville, Ayrmer, Alveston, and other places.

One special feature of the exhibit here was one of their jobs in the "white"—an unfinished carriage showing the quality of the woods used in their jobs and the mode of construction.

Their exhibit was not only a success in the manner pointed out, but also in the way of sales, as the number of carriages shown were white cards marked "sold," some of the visitors evidently appreciating a good article upon seeing it.

INSANE ACT

Youth Kills His Mother and Sister and Injures Four Children.

Pittsburg, Oct. 10.—While laboring under mental aberration, the result of strain of perfecting an appliance for patents on an airplane, were pending in Washington, D. C., Charles Cawley, a 17-year-old boy, of Homestead, Pa., early to-day killed his mother and one sister, and fatally injured four other children. He also tried to kill his two older brothers but was overpowered and turned over to the police.

The weapon used was an axe, with which he crushed and hacked his victims beyond recognition. The injured are in an hospital. The dead—Mrs. Hannah Cawley, aged 40 years; Belle Cawley, aged 12. The injured—Joseph, aged 15 months, will not live; Adeline, aged 6, will not recover; Raymond, aged 6, twin of Adeline, will not live; Agnes, aged 10 years, will not live. The Cawley family live in a six room house in Homestead. Last night all the members retired at ten o'clock. Mrs. Cawley and Belle occupied one bed, while the others, Joseph, Adeline, Raymond and Agnes occupied other beds and crabs in the same room. Charles, the murderer, his brothers, James and Harry, occupied a room adjoining their mother's room. Early this morning Charles quietly arose and dressed himself, crept down to the cellar in his stocking feet and got an axe. Coming upstairs, he went into his mother's room, where the victims were all sleeping, and after turning up the light perpetrated the awful deed. He then started for his brothers' room, but James had been awakened by the groups in his mother's room. As Charles entered, he seized a heavy rocking chair, and after a fierce struggle overpowered him and turned him over to the police. On the way to the station he fought furiously, but after being placed in a cell he calmed down. He did not seem to realize what he had done.
