Notorious Train Robber Breaks Jail in B. C.

Three Others Also Run Off at Same Time-Dug Hole Under Wall While Working In Brickyard - Scaled High Fence and Got Away-Guards Accused of Negligence-Miner Was

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 10.—Bill Miner has escaped from Westminster pentitentiary. The most notorious outlaw and train robber in America, the only man who ever held up a train in Canada, is now believed to be heading for the international boundary is miles distant from Westminster, if he has not already crossed it, on the fastest horse he could steal. His pala, Shorty Dunn, who is serving a lite term, and Columbum, his Ontario confederate, in Kamloops train robbery in May, 1906, are not with him, not having had old Bill's opportunity to get away.

Three others escaped with Miner, but he will likely drop them, all being juniors in the game Miner plays. They are Clarke of Nanaimo, three years for forgery; W. J. Woods, Victoria, a like term; A. F. McCloskey, Vancouver, seven years, robbery. All had served a year of their term.

With these, Miner, working in the brickyard, had dug a hole under the wall, and had made their escape nearly an hour before it was discovered.

Ottawa, as well as every police centre in British Columbia and Washington State, were immediately wired, and every available officer in Westminster and Vancouver has been pressed into the chase.

Deputy Warden Bourke says the escape was due to negligence of guards.

Miner was the best behaved prisoner. Only a few weeks ago he joked about his home life to a mounted police officer, who had assisted in his memorable capture.

GEN. PICQUART ASSAULTED.

Assailant in Danger of Being Killed by Crewd.

Rochefort, France, Aug. 12.—Gen. Picquart, Minister of War, was insuited and afterward assaulted in the railroad station here last evening when returning from the dedication of a monument to Edouard Grimanx, who was prominent in securing a revision of the sentence of Capt. Dreyfus. A workman suddenly emerged from the crowd and was appleading Gen. Picquart and spat in his face.

Gen. Picquart threw off his assailant. Simultaneously with the outrage the crowd with shorts of anger at the indignity offered the War Minister, surged forward and fell upon his assailant, who was trampled and in danger of being killed. He was finally rescued by the police and taken to Jall, badly mauled and bruised.

OBJECT TO STRIKE-BREAKERS.

Telegraph Operators Refuse to Work
With Them—General Strike.
Chicago, Aug. 10.—Since midnight,
when 200 operators struck rather than
work with strike-breakers at Los Angeles, there has been little doing in
the Chicago office of the Western
Union Telegraph Co. at Jackson
boulevard and Clark street, or in the
branch offices scattered throughout
the city

Only six wire chiefs and four veteran telegraph operators were left in the main Chicago offices when the union men, in answer to a whistle, rushed from the keys on the ninth and tenth floors and congregated in front of the building. The strike order issued by the executive board of the Chicago local union to the night operators applies also to day operators, thus affecting some 700 men employed in the main Chicago office during day hours.

There was no disorder, but fifty policemen were detailed to see that no crowds congregated about the Western Union building, or the Board of Trade.

Pump Breaks Down and Third of the City's Supply Cut Off.


