### THE BENDING WORKS BLOWER.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Sir,—The noise made by this factory is simply terrible. People would not mind if it lasted an hour or two a day, but, running as it does for 10 hours, it has so annoyed the residents in the vicinity that they will hear such remarks as, "It's pity it does not burn up" or "I wish it would blow up and end that infernal noise."

I called on Mr. Byrom about the noise, as a deputation of one. He said he did not wish to annoy anyone, but did not know how to stop it. He had had the Park Bros. up about it, and they knew of no way to prevent it, either. He said he would see again, but nothing had been done.

As those machinists cannot do anything, it will be in order for me to invent a simple and cheap solution of the difficulty, and I think the following method will prove a success. Simply make a sand jacket around the galvanized iron pipes. A drum would make no noise if surrounded by sand or fine clay; neither would a fiddle, the bow would produce no more noise than if drawn across the breast-bone of a goose. That blower makes the noise near the floor of the factory, and scarcely be heard there, but, by the time it reaches the air above the building it is charged with all the vibrations of the galvanized piping, producing the noise that is heard second. Pack the pipe in sand or clay, Mr. Byrom, and end the nuisance.

## TRIED TO BURN SCHOOL

subjects of the friend and ally of the King, His Highness the Emperor of Japan. He trusted reparation would be made to the injured and the offenders punished.

Tokyo, Sept. 11.—The accounts of the demonstrations at Vancouver, published in the Tokyo evening papers, caused no excitement. The people, like the Government officials, regard as foolish the idea of a trouble-making complication. A few of the morning papers discussed the matter dispassionately.

The Asahi points out the uselessness of mob violence, and cautions the Japanese against retaliation in kind. It says that the Canadian Government undoubtedly will take measures against similar regrettable affairs, and concludes:

"Retaliation will not rectify. Our treaty with Great Britain extends to Canada, and our treaty with the United States will be revised in 1911."

Other newspapers say that the affair is regrettable.

The previous despatch from San Francisco, saying that Ishii was stoned and forced to take refuge in an hotel, is regarded as the most serious feature of the affair, but this report is not confirmed by the Foreign Office.

The Japanese press and officials generally show no disturbance over the immigration question, and it is considered in official circles here that the matter will be ultimately settled satisfactorily, although sporadic outbreaks are expected.

The Japanese officials decline to say what steps, if any, have been taken in the Canadian trouble, pending further information.

The Foreign Office is not disturbed by the Vancouver affair, and is quite confident that everything will be done to protect the Japanese community.

The Foreign Office has received a despatch from the Japanese consul-general at Ottawa, saying that the Canadian Government will express its regret for the occurrence at Vancouver, and take steps to prevent further trouble.

An official of the Foreign Office said to the Associated Press: "We have the utmost confidence in the Canadian Government, as we also have in that of America."

Nothing Official.

London, Sept. 11.—Neither the Colonial Office nor the Foreign Office has received official information respecting the anti-Asiatic riots at Vancouver, B. C. Two long despatches have been received at the Japanese embassy from Canada. The Colonial Office directors say they do not expect any communication from Ottawa on the subject, and that while the event is greatly regretted, the Imperial authorities are sure the matter can be amicably settled between the Japanese officials and the Canadian Government.

### The Real Reason.

London, Eng., Sept. 11.—The News says the way of securing peace in Vancouver is to attack the trouble not on racial but on economic grounds. Anger against the yellowman arises, not from the fact that he is yellow, but because he is cheap. He, from the industrial viewpoint, is a blackleg. Let him come in as a free man, but only with loyalty to his class, not as a tool sweeper.

### Supreme Struggle.

London, Sept. 11.—The Daily Mail prints an interesting sensational article by Hamilton Fry, who is evidently familiar with the Pacific coast countries of America, and the Orient, and who sums up the incident by saying:

"The wonder is that it has not happened before." He says that California and British Columbia have the same problem to puzzle over and agrees with Dr. Goldwin Smith, that "before many years there must be a supreme struggle between Europeans and Asiatics for supremacy on the Pacific coast."
