In Halifax in particular large sums had been wagered that Borden would head the polls and that the Conservatives would carry at least half the seats.

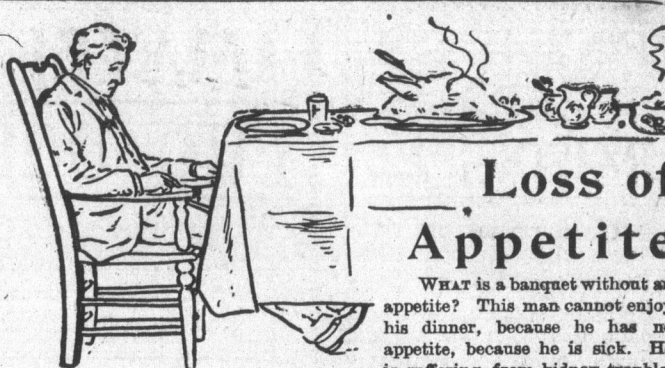
Great enthusiasm prevails in the Liberal camp, as may be expected, but wherever the Conservatives have held meetings they have shown themselves to be still full of fight.

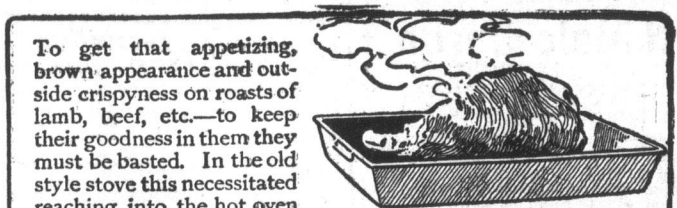
