New York, April 3.—The eve of the second meeting of the committees representing the anthracite mine workers and their employers finds the situation, so far as the hard coal fields are concerned, unchanged from that disclosed in the communications that have passed between the contending forces,

which have been made public. Both sides are hopeful, however, and there is a feeling among those vitally interested in the struggle that some way out of the present difficulty will be found. This feeling is based on the fact that each side has only played its first card, and that the real negotiations have not yet hegun. Both sides are hopeful, however, and

Rumors that thousands of men would not obey the suspension order have proved groundless. The district leaders report that the only colliery working full handed is the People's Coal Companies Oxford operation, in the northern field, which is run almost exclusively by non-union men.

President Mitchell, who arrived yes-President Mitchell, who arrived yesterday, said that more than 100,000 soft coal miners have already been granted the 1903 scale, and predicted that by the end of the week fully 80 per cent. of the bituminous workers will have been given the advance. He thought that within 45 days every soft coal mine, where the men are organized, will be working on a union basis.

SHOT TWELVE KAFFIRS. They Murdered Policemen During An

Uprising At Natal.

Pletermaritzburg, Natal, April 3.-The twelve natives condemned to death for the murder of policemen during the uprising in February against the collection of the poll tax, the postponement of whose execution led to a dispute between the Imperial and Colonial Government, were their vector lonial Governments, were shot yesterday morning.

At the request of Governor McCullom, and in view of the Earl of Elgin's assurances, the Natal Ministry has

withdrawn its resignation.

Called Murder. Called Murder.

London, April 3.—The announcement of the execution of the Natal natives was received with angry cries of "shame" from the Irish Nationalists and Labor benches, and from some Liberals in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon. One Ministerialist amid cheers and some protests described the execution as "bloodthirsty murder," and James Ramsey Macdonald, secretary of the Labor representation committee, promptly moved an adjournment of the House to discuss the manner in which martial law was being applied in Natal, and "to the imminent and great danger to which the native subjects of the crown are involved in subjects of the crown are involved in its administration."

The motion was debated last even-ing, but nothing new developed.
