Major-General O'Grady-Italy Spoke to the Returned Officers.

Capt. Sutton's Burial.

Quebec, Jan. 12.—The body of the late Capt. Sutton arrived by the 1 o'clock train yesterday, accompanied

by a strong escort, composed of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, under the command of Lieut-Col. Macdonald. They were brought on this side of the river by the ferry about 1.30 o'clock, and immediately transferred to the residence of Mr. Justice Touthier, St. Louis street.

There was a guard of honor, composed of a strong detachment of the garrison troops and Quebec militia, preceded by a detachment of mounted police, and of state band.

The military authorities have offered Mrs. Sutton to bury her late husband with military honors, which offer has been accepted, and the funeral will take place this morning at 10 o'clock from the Basilica.
