Buenos Ayres, Jan. 14.—Disturban-ces continued all days yesterday despite the fact that 800 Bolshevist ring leaders are under arrest. Shots were fired from the roofs and windows and policemen and soldiers and street cars were fired upon. The street car service was abandoned at nightfall.

## GREAT ALLIED POWERS HAVE FIVE DELEGATES AT PEACE CONFERENCE

Canada, Australia, South Africa and India To Have Two Each—Representation To Be On Basis of Extent of Interest of Each Nation in Peace Settlement

Paris, Jan. 14.—France, Great Britain, Italy, United States and Japan will each have five representatives at the Peace Congress. This was decided today by the Supreme Council. The British Domimons, it was decided, will be represented apart from Great Britain. Canada, Australia, South Africa and India will have two representatives each, and New Zealand one delegate. Consideration of the question of Russian representation is postponed.

The size of representation for each nation was decided on, not as proposed by the French plan, in accordance with the part played by the nation in the war, but following the American and British plate in proportion to the extent of the interest of each nation in the peace settlement. The question of representation settled, the Council began a discussion of the procedure. The proposal by President Wilson concerning the sending of problems to technical committees for examination, was adopted.

At the meeting on Wednesday the Council will fix upon the methods of work and the guiding principles of the conference.
