LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Hutchinson of the Digby bragdy has been arrested.

There are 108 Divisions of Some Temperance working in Nova Scotia.

The total increase in the population of the County of Digby, in 1882, was 1,000.

Wm. E. Dodge, the well known New York merchant, died on Monday, aged 78. He was worth \$100,000.

A tenant, named Drees, in St. John, cut his wife's throat and then his own. Jealousy is said to be the cause.

The system of vital statistics has been required by the Dominion Government. The returns will be delivered monthly.

It is rumored that the Breckenridge difficulty will be settled by the appointment of the former to a judgeship.

Dalton McCarthy has given notice that he will again introduce his bill for the establishment of a Court of Railway Commission.

At the Boudreau Quarry, Rockland, 35 men are at work, clearing off for spring's work. This Company has on hand 700 tons of stone.

River Hebert Items.

Mr. Frederick Boargro, while in the employ of A. Seaman & Co., removing debris preparatory to the working of the new quarries, the other day, had his shoulder dislocated by a bank of earth and stones falling upon him. He is under treatment of Dr. Hewson and is progressing favorably.

The coal mine at River Hebert and worked by James Cormier & Co., situated on the eastern side of the river nearly opposite the mine owned by the Minicoid Coal Mine Transportation Company, is yielding a superior quality of coal which commands for private use a high price and rapid sale, especially since Judge Morse's decision which has acted as a refrigerant.

Amherst Division S. of T. held their 21st Anniversary in Music Hall, Amherst, on Wednesday evening last. The Amherst cornet band furnished good music, and the ladies good cake, &c., so that the affair passed off most agreeably to all present.

Mr. S. E. Freeman, merchant of Moncton, missed his cash and goods one day last week from his store; circumstances caused suspicion to rest on one John Matterson, who was arrested and brought before Stipendiary Cuvier, at Amherst, on Tuesday evening. The evidence was sufficient to detain, remanded him for a week to allow the prosecutor to obtain further testimony.

Parroboro Items.

P. R. Orlinton, of Kingsport, has been here on timber business for his new ship.

Potatoes are selling from the Brig "Anna" at 25c per barrel on account of vessel leaking.

Diphtheria has appeared in a few instances at Halfway River, Port Greville, and Parroboro.

Silas Pratt had a cow so injured by parties driving on the afternoon of the great Carnival that she had to be killed.

L. W. McKay, of Two Islands, assisted by Roberts and Haws, are building a good sized vessel on the east side of Partridge Island River.

E. Vickery, Esq., M. P. P., was buried on Ash Wednesday, with Masonic honors, had a very large attendance. He will be missed at Parroboro as he was authority on many disputed points.

Charles O'Neal has a contract for about 300,000 ft. of ship timber. Jesse Jeffers also a contract for about 200,000 ft. ship timber.

Personal and Political.

Prince Napoleon has been released.

Archbishop O'Brien is to visit Chatham next week.

Archbishop McCabe, of Dublin, is dead.

Hon. John O'Donohue has been sworn in as a member of the Senate.

Benjamin Russell, Esq., chief Legislative reporter of Nova Scotia, has resigned. He is succeeded by his late assistant, Mr. S. A. Olesley.

A pleasant feature of the evening in the members, at Ottawa, on Thursday, was that Sir Charles Tupper and his son were sworn in together, both holding the Bible at the same time. This is the first instance of the kind known of in a Canadian Parliament.

At the Opposition caucus held on Saturday, Charles Burpee (Sunbury) was elected permanent chairman in place of Rymal, and Mr. Blake was re-elected leader. The whips appointed were: Ontario, Quebec, Dr. Rinfret; New Brunswick, King; Nova Scotia, E. Robertson (Sheburne).

Methodist Union.

Seventy-four members of the Methodist Quarterly Boards of St. John City, Portland and Fairville, met in the Centenary Church, Monday evening, and it was decided by a vote of 10 to 1, to be held at St. John, N. S., on Tuesday, the 20th inst.

At the basis of Union adopted by the committee was the following: "Resolved, that the several Quarterly Boards, this motion was carried almost unanimously, only two dissenting."

Last Tuesday the third Quarterly Meeting of the year was held in the basement of the Methodist Church in this place. The Rev. Dr. Pickett and Stewart gave very full and interesting expostitions of the Union question, and eventually a resolution accepting the basis of Union was unanimously passed.

New Methodist Church, Baie Verte.

The dedicatory services of the new Methodist Church on Sabbath last, were of an unusually interesting character, and although the day was not at all favorable, the congregations were quite large. The collections amounted to \$110. The sale of the pews on Monday realized in the 35 disposed of the sum of \$3,485; ten burling \$120 each, ten \$100, and the balance making up the remainder. And on Thursday evening, when another sale is to be held, it is expected the whole debt will be paid for. The Baie Verte are proud of their Church, and pastor and people are in excellent spirits or the result of their arduous endeavors.

Church Opening.

Opening of St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church, at Amherst, on Sunday last.

This Church is situated at the corner of Victoria and Lawrence Streets. It has a large tower, a comfortable basement for prayer meetings and Sunday School. Great taste has been shown with the interior of the building, making it attractive and comfortable. Each side has four gothic windows of colored glass. The seats are of black and white walnut rails, and very comfortable. The seating capacity is 800, and the seats all free. The platform has been furnished with a handsome set, consisting
