Barrel Physician One of the Heroes of the Country.

There was a sharp ring at the bell, which was followed by footsteps inside, and the door was opened.

"Mrs. — is very sick."

It was 1 o'clock in the morning. Mrs. — lived 12 miles away, and the roads were bad. It was snowing heavily, and blowing a gale.

Mrs. — was poor. She already owed a considerable bill to the doctor who had just answered the summons. The wind whistled about the open door, and the flakes eddied in and melted against the chimney of the lamp in the doctor's hand. The caller left, and in a quarter of an hour the doctor was on his way in the face of the storm. He stilled the voice of pain in that hour 12 miles away. He brought on sleep, and left the sufferer pointing towards recovery.

When he turned from his stable door and entered his home, the sun was up and the cock had crowed the morn.

His had been a work of charity, yet he did not believe himself a Samaritan.

Do you ever think of the country doctor as the smartest of the city physician passes your door? He is one of the heroes of our young nation. As peace has her victories, she has her heroes, even greater than those of war. He who fights with blood and flesh visible, dressed in the uniform of the enemy, fights while the world watches, fights to kill, while the press waits to make his name known are the smoke has cleared away. The soldier fights for honor, love, and country, fights for crosses, decorations, and recognition. But what of the country doctor who fights to save, who fights the foe invisible, fights without the calcium of the press being pointed on him; fights through cold and heat, darkness and discouragement, mile upon mile he goes.

League upon league is nothing new to him.

Remember the country doctor. He is no coachman.

His own hands become numbed and blue with the driving. There are no brass buttons beside him, there is no high-stepping hackney, or pneumatic-tired carriage to ride in.

He knows no asphalt.

Did you ever try the side lines and feel the corduroy?

Matriarch of the same school, graduate of the same university, seat-mate, chum, fellow of his confrere of the city, they parted at the convocation of the year, attended the same lectures, witnessed the same operations, enjoyed the same opportunities, and then they parted. He journeyed to the quiet and solitude of the simple, single-hearted life near the soil. Obscure? Yes, for his name is upon no brass plate, or reflected to hurrying humanity from a transept.

His name is not noted in the press as performing some remarkable operation. Yet, even as his brother of the city, he does perform remarkable operations.

Is the anatomy of the son of the soil, of the hand-maiden of the country, is it less complicated, is it less delicately constructed, than that of the city's great ones?

Not much.

So on he goes, a hero, sometimes bringing in the youthful pilgrim of the night, and sometimes easing the journey of the aged one as he moves to the other shore. On he goes, seeks no other satisfaction than the doing of duty.
