Transmission of Electric Power. To the Editor of the Times :

Transmission of Electric Power. To the Editor of the Times: Sir,--Your article In Saturday's paper on the question of transmitting electricity and of the factories going to the water power, instead of the power going to the factories, is, in the face of present day facts, entirely wrong. There is no difficulty in car-rying electric current commercially to distances approaching 50 miles. The Pioneer Fower Co., of Ogden, Utah, delivers 4,000 horse power every day in Sait Lake City, 38 miles from its power house, in competition with coal at \$1.65 per ton. The Blue Lakes Water Co., of California, is de-livering power for 45 miles, also in competition with cheap coal, and the Pakersfield Co. has its line completed to Los Angeles, over 80 miles away. The Pioneer Co., of Ogden, before re-ferred to, has built a line 30 miles beyond Sait Lake City, making a total length of 68 miles, over which it must deliver power cheaper than half what it does in Hamilton. On October 11th this company connected two of its lines together, making a total length of 76 miles, and for sev-eral hours, as an experiment, carried 1,300 horse power over it at a poten-tial of 27,580 volts, and the actual losi in transmission was three per yeat. Three No. 1 wires were used in the line, the diameter of each being less than one-quarter infin. At Niagara Falls, to go no farther from home, no single industry has been trary, they are now 'sending several thousand horse power to the Buffalo users, and the quantity avoid has only been limited by their/not having enough dynamos to make what was called for. The company is now under con-tract to deliver 10,000 horse power in Buffalo by January ist, 1898. This
