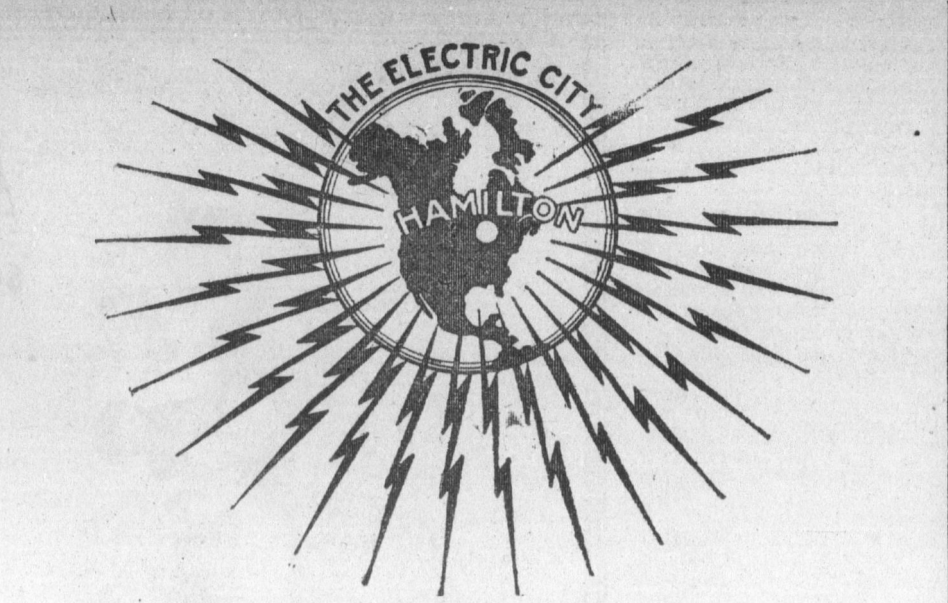

The Times Goes Into the Homes

SULTAN'S INVESTURE GIRDING OF MOHAMMED V. WITH THE SWORD OF OTHMAN.

The Ceremony Picturesque but Less Magnificent Than in the Case of Other Sultans—Symbolical Taking of Constantinople Again—Heroes in Khanti.

Greeks—were men from the outlying provinces of the empire and of its wilder zones—Albanians, Kurds and Lazes, with here and there a swarthy Arab or a coal black African.

Rough stands had been erected at short intervals, the ceremonies along the route being especially used for the accommodation of sightseers, among whom were thousands of Moslem women, whose colored chachafs with the fexes, uniforms and red flags of the soldiery made a scene one of the richest coloring. It seemed to be a woman's festival, for women were in the majority.

They filled the streets, the verandas and the terraces. Those who crowded the window sills had raised their yashmaks, showing their pallid faces, with large pensive eyes blackened with kohl, and the ample folds of the feredje framing their cheeks gave them a curious resemblance to nuns.

ALL FOR PEACE. GERMANY'S FLEET IS NOT FOR AGGRESSION.

This Declaration of Prince Henry of Prussia and of Naval Officers of High Rank—The Kaiser's Message to the Navy League.

Kiel, June 5.—Prince Henry of Prussia, representing his brother, Emperor William, spoke as follows to-day at the annual meeting of the Navy League held here under the Presidency of Grand Admiral Von Koester: "Every one is glad that a good understanding of the aims of the Navy League once more has been established. This organization should devote itself to the furtherance and the carrying out of the legal naval programme. In addition to a powerful army, we need a fleet in order to assure peace."

Admiral Von Koester said that Germany was not considering a fleet against any definite opponent, but as a means of self-defence. "We desire to live on the best terms with all civilized countries," he declared.

Admiral Weber then made an address in which he referred to the "concentration of the strongest fleet in the world in the North Sea." He said he hoped war would never happen, but that Germany, after her occurrences, was obliged to bear in mind the possibility of such a contingency. Admiral Weber rejected the idea of an agreement with Great Britain in the matter of naval construction.

A telegram was received from Emperor William, saying: "Our principal task in the future, as in the past, is to open a way to make the fleet popular and to create German sea power for the assurance of peace."

The chief business of the day was in relation to a speech by Admiral Weber, advising strongly against any understanding with Great Britain, which he said, wanted to possess only a fleet large enough to control all foreign trade. Such an understanding would be impossible and eventually would lead to war.

A resolution in accordance with Admiral Weber's views was carried by a large majority.

NELSON ISOLATED. Great Damage Done on Railways and Ranches.

Vancouver, B. C., June 6.—Nelson has been completely shut off from the rest of the world for the past two days as the result of floods to the north, east and south. It is hoped communication will be restored early this week. Reports of damage are coming in. Railways and fruit ranches suffered severely, the damage in almost every instance resulting from mountain creeks jumping their banks and sweeping earth and timber away. The C. P. R. and Great Northern Railways have had many sections of track swept away, and it will take considerable time to make repairs, even if no further damage is done. No loss of life so far is reported.

Twenty-five years ago W. J. Costello, the first white child to be born in Calgary, was deced a 25-foot lot shortly after his birth by the then village authorities. The property was held in trust by his parents until Costello came of age. Yesterday the young man sold his lot for \$18,000. The property is on Eighth avenue, opposite the post office.

RUGBY. THE A. M. C.

One of the Historic Old School's Late Masters Here.

Mr. H. T. Rhoades, father of Mr. H. G. Rhoades, of this city, who has been visiting his son for the last few days, left this morning for Quebec, where he will take the steamer for Liverpool, thence to his home at Rugby, in the County of Hereford, England. In January Mr. Rhoades left Rugby to take a trip around the world, taking the Peninsula and Oriental steamship line to Bombay. After passing through the great cities of Northern India, he visited Hong Kong, Japan and Honolulu, from which place he sailed to San Francisco. His American route was via Yosemite, the Grand Canyon of Arizona and Chicago, then to Hamilton. Mr. Rhoades was superannuated from Rugby Grammar School seven years ago, at the age of 65. He is enjoying the best of health, is vigorous in mind and is reaping the benefit of a well spent life. For years he played an important part in conducting the school at Rugby, being one of the thirty masters there.

Rugby Grammar School was founded in 1567, in the time of Queen Elizabeth. There is a classical and a modern side to it, the classical side chiefly prepares boys for the universities of Oxford and Cambridge; the modern side teaches modern languages and prepares boys for the army. A new speech room has just been completed, which is to be opened by King Edward on July 3. The buildings are plain and substantial and have a chapel for the boys which contains some valuable old stained glass. The original chapel of Dr. Arnold's time was too small to accommodate the present numbers, and it has been completely remodelled. The number of students who may now attend this school is 500. Among those who have been distinguished head masters of Rugby are Dr. Arnold; Dr. Tait, afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury; Dr. Temple, also afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury; Herford, who is now Bishop of Hereford. The present head master is Dr. James, who has held the position for about 14 years.

Rugby Grammar School is best known by the book which describes it "Tom Brown's School Days," written by Judge Hughes, who was a boy in Dr. Arnold's time. It is also famous because of the game of Rugby football, which originated there.

Two small fields in the city of London were given to the school by one, Lawrence Sheriff, many years ago. These fields are now covered with buildings which yield an enormous rent, so that by reason of this endowment the school has become a very wealthy institution.

MAD DOG IN PARIS. Paris, Ont., June 6.—Anticipating the development of rabies in the three-year-old son of William North, a citizen of Paris, father and son will go to New York, where the little tot will undergo treatment for the dread seizure. The expenses of the trip will be borne by the Paris Council. The child was bitten some time ago. The father destroyed the dog at once, and sent the head to Ottawa for analysis.

A telegram from the capital city brought back the information that symptoms of rabies were unmistakable. Fear is general all over the neighborhood to-night, because the dog had been at large for some time.

The Council has already issued a proclamation prohibiting dogs from being allowed out during this month. After that they must be muzzled or held in leash.
