

Admiral Von Koester said that Germany was not considering a fleet against any definite opponent, but as a means of self-defence. "We desire to live on the best terms with all civilized countries," he declared.

Admiral Weber then made an address in which he referred to the "concentration of the strongest fleet in the world in the North Sea." He said he hoped war would never happen, but that Germany, after recent occurrences, was obliged to bear in mind the possibility of such a contingency. Admiral Weber rejected the idea of an agreement with Great Britain in the matter of naval construction.
