E. J. PERRY CUT WOMAN'S THROAT AT TRURO N. S.

Gave Himself up to Police and Claimed he Acted in Self Defence.

Truro, N. S., Sept. 19—What looks like a case of desperate murder came to light this morning at four o'clock when E. J. Perry gave himself up to the police. He told a story of having been attacked by Mrs. Mand Wright in her house on Foundry Hill, and killing her in self defence. The woman's body was found covered with blood and with her throat cut from ear to ear.

Perry exhibited cuts on his wrists and throat to substantiate his story of the attack, but the

cuts appear to be self-inflicted.

The Wright woman has led rather a checkered career, and her husband is said to be living in the west. Perry belongs to Charlotte-town, P. E. I., but has been in town all week. The deed, the outcome of which will likely result in a charge of murder against Perry, was the result of jealousy.

It is the opinion of the doctors that the woman was killed Saturday night though nothing was heard of it until early this morning. Three razors were discovered in the house, and Perry is said to have borrowed a couple of them

from a neighbor yesterday. When a reporter visited the house the upstairs portion was in a topsy-turvy condition and the room in which the crime was com-

mitted was covered with blood.
