This being the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, the ceremonies peculiar to the day were duly carried out in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. High Mass was celebrated at 10 o'clock by Rev. J. C. McDonald, Rector of St. Dunstan's College, His Lordship the Bishop occupying his throne. An appropriate sermon was preached by Rev. A. J. McIntyre. The High Altar was suitably decorated.

The Pastor of Fort Augustus, Rev. A. J. McDonald, ever zealous for the welfare of his parishioners and the improvement of his Church, has had a very beautiful and elegantly finished pulpit, from the workshop of Mr. John Nelson, placed in his new completely furnished Chapel. This is certainly a very necessary addition to such a commodious edifice, and in point of design, superior workmanship and artistic finish, is in pleasing harmony with the general interior of the whole building.

The Vice-Admiralty Court met on Thursday last, for the purpose of hearing the case of the Queen v. schooner Highland Light, and her cargo, Mr. E. J. Hodgson, G. C. appeared for the Defendant Government. No counsel appeared for the schooner. Mr. Hodgson, before calling the witnesses, stated the facts to the Court, which were substantially the same as published at the time of the seizure of the vessel. The proof of the case was then submitted to the Court, after which Chief Justice Palmer condemned the vessel and her cargo, fishing gear and outfit, and declared the same forfeited to the Crown for breach of the treaty of 1812. An order was made ordering the vessel to be sold at Georgetown on Tuesday, the 14th December, instant.

In the criminal applications arising out of the proceedings under the Scott Act in this city some weeks ago, the writs were refused, the majority of the Court (the Chief Justice and Judge Handley), being of opinion that Mr. FitzGerald had not disqualified himself from sitting on the case by reason of his having directed the policemen to lay the information. Mr. Justice Peters dissented, and was of opinion that no man could be both prosecutor and judge, and that judgment on Mr. FitzGerald's disqualification should be made on the basis of the facts of the case, and not on the basis of the proceedings.
