LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Mr. Borden's tour is not in full swing and is eminently successful. Immense throngs assembled to hear him at all his meetings.

At Halifax on Monday, Alexander Collier was sentenced to three years in Dorchester penitentiary for biting off part of another man's ear.

An explosion of gas last Saturday night near De Moines, Iowa, wrecked the business quarter of Cedar Falls, Iowa, causing loss of \$100,000. No one is dead or severely hurt.

Dr. Pugsley, of St. John, N. B., has been appointed Minister of Railways, by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. No Minister of Public Works has yet been named.

After three of the closest finishes seen in the present Grand Circuit meetings at Roadville, Mass., on the 23rd, Kruger was returned winner of the Norfolk stake, valued at \$6,000.

The trot at Primrose Park, near Peaks Station, on Thursday last, was very successful. There was a large number in attendance and good betting contests were witnessed.

It is announced from Ottawa as probable that the intention to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons will be held about the middle of September, on the 18th or the 19th. Nominations will be a week earlier.

A report comes from Pontiac County, Quebec, that in some districts crops have been destroyed by a plague of grasshoppers. They are said to be so numerous that they completely stop harvesting operations by clogging the binders.

The world's record for 3 year old trotting stallions was reduced to 2001 at Roadville, Mass. on the 21st by General White as the Grand Circuit meeting. Both heads of the American Horse Breeder Fairbury went to a son of Axworthy in most remarkable time.

Rev. Isidore Cavanagh, S. J., Professor of Science in Loyola College Montreal, who had been on a brief visit to the Province left on return Tuesday morning. On Sunday he preached an excellent sermon at the high Mass in the Cathedral.

Boston advices of the 24th say: The greater portion of New England is suffering from one of the most protracted draughts in 25 years, and the country districts have been badly hit financially. With the exception of two showers there has been no rain in Boston and vicinity for a month and the grass is the color of a board.

Rev. Brother Alderick of St. Mary's College, Oakland, California, who had been visiting his aged father, Allen McDonald, Lower Montague, and other friends on the Island, left for home on Thursday last. It is twenty-one years since he left the Island. He enjoyed his visit very much and is full of admiration of the beauties of our Province.

A Norwegian seaman who had deserted from his vessel the Monrovia, at Halifax was captured by the police and returned to the ship. Twenty-four hours afterwards when the gale of Sunday was at its height, he jumped over board and attempted to reach the shore, two miles away. He failed in the attempt and was drowned. A shipmate who jumped overboard with him was rescued in an exhausted condition.

A dispatch from St. John's, Nfld. says: "There is strong hope that a cure for leprosy has at last been discovered," says Dr. F. Montisambert, director of Public Health who is in the city. The record at Tracadie since the first use of the remedy has been one discharged as cured two years ago, and a woman is progressing so favorably that she will be at liberty in a short time. Others who have used the remedy declare themselves better and stronger.

On Saturday last, a four year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ewen W. Martin of Cross Roads, Lot 48, was alone in the house. She got hold of some matches and set fire to her clothes. Her screams were first heard by a man, who was painting the house. He ran in and promptly smothered the flames, but before the child was badly burned all over her body. Dr. Dewar was summoned as quickly as possible, but all he could do was unavailing. The little one died about one o'clock Sunday afternoon.

A despatch from the 26th from Johnstown, Pa., says: A cyclone approaching the dimensions of a cyclone caused great damage last night and early today in Somerset County. One woman was severely injured and near Bellville a path five hundred yards wide and a mile long was swept by the terrific wind. Houses and barns were destroyed and the growing crops were leveled. The tracks of the Pittsburgh Westmoreland and Southern Railway were washed away in a number of places, lying up the road.

A London despatch of the 26th says: The Standard's lobby correspondent says that great indignation is expressed by the Unionist members at the treatment of M.D. by the Government as shown by St. John's cables. It is regarded as particularly unfortunate that the action of the Government should only be made public at the end of the session, but an endeavor will be made before prorogation to press matters for further information on the subject. The Times discussing the reorganization of the Colonial office says it is of great significance that the Colonial office should now officially be confined to the Crown Colonies. This is due to the assertion at the Conference of the party of status between the self-governing dominions and no other colonies. The change is as full of meaning as that of the middle of the last century which severed the connection of the Colonies with the war department.

The drawing in connection with the lottery of the lobster boat, owned by B. J. and H. B. McDonald, Cable Head, took place in the office of Dr. McLaughlin, Head St. Peter's Bay on Tuesday Aug. 20 last. The drawing was conducted by R. D. McLaughlin, M.D. and Mr. Barinby O'Hare assisted by Miss Beth McLaughlin and Mr. H. B. McDonald. The winning number 115 was held by Mr. Vincent Sutherland of the firm of Sutherland Bros. well known lobster packers, and the boat became his property. To those who conducted the drawing and to all who so cheerfully assisted in making the lottery a success, B. J. and H. B. McDonald wish to return their thanks and to express their sense of obligation.—Com.
