

Those who have never seen the much talked of dynamite explosive will be interested to know that it looks very much inke moist brown sugar. Nitroglycerine which is formed by the action of nitric acid upon glycerine, at a low tempera-ture is the active agent in dynamite, but is mixed with some absorbent substance to render it safer to handle than the liquid glycerine. The absorbent material thus used is a silicious earth-a fine white powder composed of the remains of infusoria, and resembling powdered chalk; this takes up two or three times its weight of the nitro-glycerine, without becoming pasty, and the ingredients are easily mixed, leaden vessels and wooden spoons being used to avoid dangerous friction.
