LONDON, May 10.

John Redmond, leader of the Irish Party, has written to Premier Asquith, reminding him of the favourable expressions used in Parliament on the question raised by the Duke of Norfolk, about abolishing from the declaration which the monarch must make before a new Parliament of the old words abjuring the Church of Rome, which Mr. Redmond declares are most offensive to all members of the Church of Rome. The cabinet to-day decided to introduce a bill amending the declaration against Transub-stantiation, Adoration of and the Sacrifice of the Mass, substituting "are contrary to my belief" for "are superstitions and idolatrous," and omitting all reference to the Pope. The major-ity of the members of parliament are believed to favour this change but the Orangemen and extreme Protestants will oppose them.
