

Has the Emperor Been Spirited Away.

Special to Evening Telegram.
PEKIN, To-Day.
The situation at Peking is becoming worse. A veritable panic prevails among the Manchus. One report fixed tonight for an outbreak, but the presence of 15,000 Manchus troops against 3,000 Chinese insures the safety of the capital for the present. The only danger seems to be from a sudden attack against the throne or against officials which might precipitate a massacre of the Manchus. Race feeling is becoming intensified. Rumors are current that the Emperor has been spirited away and that Prince Ching, who is too old for flight, has committed suicide. The American legation has issued orders that women and children living along the Peking-Hankow railway, and also in the country to the west of the line, shall proceed as soon as possible to the coast. The Government's estimate of the rebel casualties in the Hankow battle is 8,000. The Government's success is described as being largely due to the work of the naval squadron under Admiral Sah, which succeeded in enflaming the rebels in the trenches.

The Evening Chit-Chat

"I don't see why I'm so tired to-day," ruminated the lady who was calling on me.
"Why, you've just told me that you're husband brought home three guests and you had to get up a big dinner for them," I reminded her.
"Doesn't that explain it?"
"Merely no," said the lady who was calling on me. "Of course, there was a good deal of cooking to do and a tremendous pile of dishes, but I'm used to that sort of thing. I'll tell you what I think tired me more than what I did in the early afternoon I had to go to N— to pay a bill for frank and coming back, the car broke down and I was delayed. If there is anything he can't abide it's not having things just on time. And really, the worry about getting home took more out of me than the work I did when I got home."
How much energy do you think most of us use up in actual work, actually accomplishing things compared with the amount we use up in trying to get along with difficult people, in combating crochets, in looking out for sharp corners of dispositions, in harmonizing inharmonious people, and in general fretting lest we may not please or satisfy someone in some respect?
For a woman, I should put the proportion at about one to one.
For a man, perhaps less energy is

utilized in this way. Somehow men don't seem to be expected to look out for other people's crochets and please everybody in quite the same way women are.
The woman I spoke of at the beginning dissipated her energy fretting lest she should be a little bit late. Perhaps you've done that.
But if you haven't, surely you have dissipated energy in worrying lest someone or other would not be satisfied with what you were doing.
"I really like to iron," I heard a patient little mother say the other day, "but I just hate to iron Marion's shirtwaists because she is so particular about them. I declare it takes less out of me to do a whole dress for myself than a simple waist for her."
A dressmaker once told me that she would never work for people who were apt to be excessively critical and hard to please, because the day's work tired her so much more than when she worked for reasonable people.
These are but two examples of the way in which other people's crochets and whimsies and eccentricities and exactingness take more out of us than our work. Doubtless you can supply a hundred such instances from your daily experience.
And please, in case you are sufficiently interested in the line of thought to follow it up, please look for the ways in which YOUR eccentricities and exactingness take it out of other people as well as the way other people's eccentricities and exactingness take it out of you.
I assure you, you will probably find one assurance of the subject as fertile as the other, and—in case you are one of those people with whom seeing a fault in themselves is equivalent to trying to correct it,—much more valuable.

Household Notes.

Hot flannels will frequently relieve neuritic pain.
A cork is a simple makeshift when a shield for scissors is wanted.
Tired feet will be much refreshed by a change of shoes and stockings.
Fried green peppers or fried red peppers are excellent with fried chicken and rice.
If the clothes stick to a wound, do not try to tear them off, but moisten with warm olive oil.
In every kind of cleaning or polishing it is essential to dust every crevice before beginning.
Try mixing grape juice with cream cheese for the filling of a sweet sandwich. It is delicious.
Turpentine mixed in black lead and rubbed over a greasy stove is very effective for cleaning it.
Fly specks and dirt on mirror surfaces may be rubbed off with a cream made of whiting and alcohol.
Borax is one of the best exterminators for ants. Pantry shelves and cracks should be sprinkled well with it.
If the doors of a closet are wiped with gasoline or benzine after being scrubbed it helps to keep off insects.
After greasing pans for small cakes, dust with flour thickly, shaking out all that is loose. It will prevent sticking.
Corn and tomatoes are excellent canned together. Cook together and seal. This makes a tempting dish for winter.
If a pair of kid gloves tried for the first time seem too small warm them and they will easily slip over the hands.
If curtains hang near the gas, sew small lead weights in the seams. This will keep them from blowing into the flame.
The addition of a teaspoonful of paraffin to every gallon of water used for boiling clothes will help to remove stains.
To keep jellies from moulding, keep a box or bunches of thyme where the jellies are stored, which should be in a dark place.
To reduce the noise of dishwashing have a piece of heavy Turkish towel put on the drain board for the dishes to drain upon.
Have on hand plenty of boiling water, washing soda and a good disinfectant to wash all toilet articles and to pour down drains.
To remove stubborn rust spots from steel, put oil and quicklime on and leave it on for several days. Then rub with oil and rotten stone.
A good cleanser for hardwood is to wash it with a clean flannel wet in turpentine and rug lightly afterward with boiled linseed oil.
Arrowroot is excellent for thickening sauces made of fruit juices, as it neither clouds the mixture nor destroys the flavor of the fruit.
Most modern brassware is lacquered and needs only to be wiped off with a damp cloth. Work quickly and do not let the surface get wet.
A perforated rubber mat is almost an essential when the drain board of the sink is of porcelain. It saves many an ugly chip on the fine china.
Bric-a-brac should be carefully dusted before being washed in hot borax water or soap suds, in which a little ammonia has been dissolved.
A little muriatic acid added to the rinsing water after a blue or white

Capt. Bartlett Studies Flying.

New York, Oct. 20.—Capt. Robert A. Bartlett, who commanded Admiral Peary's ship Roosevelt on his trip to the North Pole, arrived in the city yesterday, after having spent the summer in Beechwood, Me., where it is reported he spent some time with a well known aviator, learning how to fly. When asked if he hoped to go exploring in a flying machine, he smiled, but admitted he had made a few flights.
Capt. Bartlett said there was still work to be done in the Arctic. Admiral Peary has said he saw land 150 miles northwest of Cape Thomas Hubbard. If such land exists, Capt. Bartlett said, it would be of great scientific interest to have it explored. Under favorable conditions it could be reached, he said, in seven or eight days' march from Nansen Strait and that the entire trip could be made in about twelve months. He thought that both Capt. Scott and Amundsen had excellent chances of reaching the South Pole, as Lieut. Shackleton, he said, had mapped the route to within 100 miles of it.

Mr. Blackall's Appeal.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—In last evening's issue of your paper appeared an appeal from Mr. Blackall on behalf of the destitute families on the Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle. I am glad that Mr. Blackall has brought the condition of those people before the notice of the public, as they are in great straits and need immediate relief, both in food and clothing.
I had occasion to travel through that portion of the coast extending from Blanc Sablon to East St. Modest, in August, doing Mission work. The fishery was then practically over—and I can at least corroborate the statements contained in Mr. Blackall's letter re destitution.
The fishery in the Straits of Belle Isle and especially on the Labrador side, is the worst that has ever been known, in the remembrance of the oldest inhabitant. One man at East St. Modest having two traps set, secured only four quintals for his summer's catch. At Lanse au Loup, where they fish with hook only, they attribute the failure of the fishery, chiefly, to the presence of so many banking schooners which crowd into the harbors while the caplin are landed, and set out all the neighboring fishing ground with trawls, while the resident fishermen are obliged to go about six miles away from their homes to use hook and line. These people have petitioned the Government asking that trawls be prohibited on their fishing ground, but their appeal has not been even acknowledged. They have no protection whatever against the southern banker who goes there and monopolise both the caplin grounds where they get bait, and the fishing ground, where they take up all the available space with their trawls.
The people of the coast are bitter in their complaint against the treatment they receive at the hands of the Nfld. bankers as well as the neglect of the Government to grant their petition. They have no representation in the House of Assembly, and receive no Government grants of public money to build roads, bridges, etc., and yet they are forced to pay taxes to the Nfld. Government. There is a general dissatisfaction against this state of affairs, and rightly so. They claim that if they are forced to pay the same taxes as the Nfld. people, they should at least receive the same attention, both in representation and protection.
We hope that the Government will be able to help those people either by giving them employment in their own locality, on some public work, or take them to some place where work can be found, when they would be able to provide for their families for the coming winter.
The Canadian Government sent a ship to the Canadian portion of the Labrador nearly two months ago and took many of their people away to give them employment for a few months before winter. After which they will take them back to their families—I have heard this by letter since my return. Thanking you in anticipation for the publication of this letter.

Woman Physician Murdered.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 24.—Dr. Helen Knabe, was found dead in bed with her throat cut to-day in her apartments, and the police after an investigation detained for examination Jefferson Haynes, negro janitor of the apartment house, his daughter Eva, and his housekeeper, Mrs. Fannie Winston.
Dr. Knabe's body was found when her assistant, Miss Catherine McPherson, entered the apartments. The body and the bed upon which it lay were covered with blood, but no weapon was found in any of the rooms, nor was it apparent that a robbery had been committed. All the windows were closed, though the physician, who was devoted to physical culture habitually slept with the windows open. Augustus Knabe, the physician's cousin, and the latter's step-father Franc Kroppe told the police that Dr. Knabe had no enemy so far as they knew. She was 45 years old and a graduate of the Indiana College of Medicine.
Dr. Knabe recently resigned as head of State bacteriological department because, it is said, she wished to devote her spare time to the study of hygiene and physical culture. Her work for the State was under the direction of Dr. J. N. Hurly, Secretary of the State Board of Health, and she was highly respected as an analyst in food inspection, and in tracing sources of contagion.
