Clergymen at the Front

"Tommy's" Friend and Cheery Com-

"The task of the clergy in this terrible crisis is a task which no other nen can discharge," said the Archbishop of Canterbury recently. And right nobly did the men of the Church rise to the task with which they were confronted when this great war broke out. No sooner was war declared than over 2,000 clergy volunteered for service as chaplains to the troops both at home and abroad, besides another 1,500 who offered themselves for work at sea. Every big warship carries a chaplain, and some of the newer Dreadnoughts, the Queen Mary, for instance, has a steel church of its own in which service is held when, OR SOME CHOPS through bad weather or other causes, a muster on deck is impossible.

Such was the anxiety of the clergy to do "their bit," that in some cases clerical "freelances" went out at their own or their friends' expense to render what spiritual aid they could in rest-stations behind the advanced trenches. Others enlisted in the Army Medical Corps as dressers and tretcher-bearers, having an opportunity for ministry among the sick and wounded all the way from the firingline to the hospital ship.

Exciting Work.

That the work of the chaplain at the Front is often of a very exciting character is illustrated by the fact that they are often under fierce shell-fire. even when conducting a funeral service. A case in point was the burial of Major-General Hubert Hamilton, who was killed instantly by a bullet in the forehead while watching operations with his staff. Sir John French, Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien, and other generals and men of high rank were present at the funeral service, held at night in the village church, lit only by the chaplain's electric lamp. Before the service was over the Germans began to shell the church, and those present had to make a hasty escape

Frequently the names of chaplains appear in the casualty lists, for they are to be found where the fight is fiercest, wearing the service khaki only by the clerical collar and black iron cross, instead of the usual star.

Of All Denominations.


The chaplain is "Tommy's" friend as well as spiritual adviser. He writes the letters for the sick and wounded: his pockets often bulge with purely secular comforts-chocolates, caramels, beef lozenges, rolls of lint, and packets of cigarettes, tabloids of morphia for men in great pain, and a few classics for his own diversion to be read at night in the homburoof by the light of a candle. Such is the life of the church militant at the Front.

These chaplains are of all denominations. There are even Jewish chaplains for the first time serving in the Jewish battalions under the Rev. Michael Adler. Colonials have their own chaplains. With the Australians in the Dardanelles is the Bishop of Kalgoorlie, who was once a London curate, and who served in the South African War.

As is well known, the Bishop of London is chaplain of the 1st Battalion of the Rifle Brigade, and spent Holy Week at the Front, at the invitation of the Commander-in-Chief. In some cases chaplains have been taken prisoner, while it might be mentioned that the Rev. W. A. Wigram, of the Crimean Memorial Church in Constantinople, who insisted on taking the place of one of the men, was one of the hostages sent by Enver Pasha to be under fire in the Gallipoli Peninsula, These hostages, it will be remembered, have since been brought back to Constantinople as a result of Sir Edward Grey's resolute message warning the Turkish Ministers that they would be responsible for any casualties to the

The Huns in India

In Our Eastern Empire, as Elsewhere, the German Has Been Proved a

Chatting to a friend recently returned from India, an Answers' man asked him whether there was much behind the statements that Germans had grossly abused our hospitality

whilst residing there. "Rather!" he said. "In fact, if you were to publish all the stories which could tell of the wiles and practices of Germans throughout the great Dependency, many of your readers would-

regard them as fiction. "Here's an illustration. About ter years ago, during the worst period of the sedition movement. I discovered the trail of the Hun, even in the jungle. I had been shooting all day, and was trying a short-cut through a very lonely district, right on the top of the Western Ghats, in order to attempt to catch my train at a wayside station. A house loomed into view, rather pretentious, surrounded by a dense garden, and I decided to give up my quest for the train, and essay a call at the house for a cup

"As I approached the house sounds of industry were plainly heard, and, before reaching the porch, a European came forward, and crisply asked to communicate direct with English my business. He was a Hun without a doubt, but invited me into the house, with very evident reluctance.

"In a sort of office we partook of lager beer, whilst my host searched me with piles of questions. I told with the goods they ship, and the him where, whom, and how I was, and politely asked him the character of his industry.

Spreading Seditious Prints.

"It was nothing more than a printing and lithographic press, the leading product being cheap and nasty playing-cards to sell in the native bazaars.

"Whilst we were chatting I observed several highly-coloured portraits of various leaders of sedition hanging on the walls, and mine host told me that his presses were working all hours turning out thousands of these prints. THE LONDON DIRECTORY CO., LTD the colouring of which alone was quite sufficient to inflame human passions.

"Before leaving him I begged spec mens, and forwarded them to the India Office, with the suggestion that here, indeed, was a concrete case of Berlin aiding and abetting the sedition movement. Beyond a formal and sterile acknowledgment nothing further eventuated, and no investigation resulted. But you may take it from me that that young German was by no means paying his way legitimately, and the production of cheap playing-cards was simply a cloak to hide the real purpose of the press.

"Take another instance of the Hun's handiwork. Many large British firms in Bombay, Calcuta, Madras, and Karachi were frequently at a loss to account for the success of German

firms quoting for contracts. The Native Clerks Were Bribed.

"It was eventually discovered that German agents bribed the native clerks in the British offices, not only to secure information concerning special contracts but also the names and particulars of large regular cus-

"To circumvent this procedure, the British firms were compelled to keep a dummy set of books in the office, the real set, or the actual ledger, being carried home each evening by some responsible member or partner in the

"Socially the Hun was treated with the usual British courtesy. He could join practically any club or gymkhana, and his business standing was always carefully recognized in municipal or other events of importance.

"And yet it was a sine qua non with the Hun never to allow a Britisher. as guest or visitor, into the German clubs, and, to render this attempted nsult worse, natives would be occasonally invited

"Nothing in the way of business ever came amiss with the German. He would dabble in forms of commerce which his British rival would contemptuously ignore.

"Moreover, the Hun away from home made no effort to hide his preference from unmanly pleasures. While the Briton sought sport, the Hun ought vice. "There you have the two national
