War News.

OFFICIAL.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
The Governor, Newfoundland: Headquarters in France report special artillery activity on the southern front.

AMERICAN SECURITIES.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
The initial list of the American securities, which the treasury is prepared to buy or borrow under the mobilization scheme was published yesterday.

LABOR PARTY MEMBERS RESIGN.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
Arthur Henderson, President of the Board of Education, and Leader of the Labor Party in the Commons; William Bryce, Parliamentary Under Secretary for Home Affairs, and Geo. H. Roberts, Lord Commissioner of the Treasury, also Labor Party leaders, have resigned from the Ministry.

LABOR CONGRESS AND COMPULSORY BILL.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
The Labor Congress to-day sent a message against the bill introduced in the Commons yesterday for compulsory military service, recommending the members of the Labor Party in Parliament to oppose the bill at all its stages.

AS THINGS LOOK IN LONDON.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
While the battle on the borders of Bessarabia is apparently still far from decision, each day finds the Russians claiming occupation of additional enemy positions, and Petrograd believes that if this process continues a short time longer, a break somewhere in the lines of the Central Powers must come.

STEADY ADVANCE OF THE RUSSIANS.
PETROGRAD, Jan. 6.
It appears not improbable, according to advices from the front, that the Austro-German forces in the southern extremity of the fighting area, will be forced back on a line running through Kolmen and Hanislaw in Galicia, in the near future, as a result of the steady and continuous advance of the Russians between the upper reaches of the River Stripa and the Roumanian frontier.

IN SALONIKA.
LONDON, Jan. 6.
The Austro-Germans are massing heavy artillery at Guevguili for an early drive on Salonika. A despatch to the Paris Temps from its Salonika correspondent last night, said that Allied aviators returning from a reconnaissance over the German lines state that large numbers of 12 inch mortars are arriving at the Greek frontier from Nish.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
The statement issued by the War Office to-night speaks of French successes in artillery engagements at various places along the front. It says between Solsons and Rheims our artillery attacked opposing batteries and inflicted heavy losses upon the works of the enemy in the region northwest of Vailly.

GREECE'S NEW LOAN.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
An Athens despatch to the Havas Agency says: The French Government informed the Greek Government that they had placed 10,000,000 francs at the disposal of Greece. This sum is an advance on a loan of forty million francs now being negotiated.

AUSTRIAN DROP BOMBS ON ALBANIAN TOWN.
CETTINJE, Jan. 6.
Five Austrian aeroplanes dropped seventeen bombs of large calibre today on Saint Jean de Medua in Albania, near the southern border of Montenegro. No damage was caused.

AVLONA SEEM TO BE THE OBJECTIVE.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
It seems more and more probable that for the present at least the Germans will undertake no movement against the Allies at Salonika, telegraphs the Athens correspondent of the Havas Agency. It has been observed that the Germans and Bulgarians are fortifying the line they hold, apparently with the intention of remaining on the defensive.

SHORT OF SUPPLIES.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
The Bulgarian army is in a lamentable condition for lack of supplies, according to information given by deserters who have arrived from Gievgezi, says a Havas despatch from Salonika, filed on Wednesday. The commissary service of the army is totally inadequate to bring up sufficient rations over the rough roads along the limited lines of communication.

BULGARS AND TURKS.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
The Havas correspondent at Athens says he is able to confirm reports of an important popular manifestation at Sofia. It was directed, he says, against the Turks, who are reported to have declared that never again would they leave Bulgarian Thrace.

ITALIAN ARMY IN ALBANIA.
PARIS, Jan. 6.
A despatch to the Temps from Rome says: The Italian military authorities, regardless of the impatience and the nervousness of the newspapers, continue to conceal the details of the operations of the Italian army in Albania. This reserve is justified by circumstances, yet the situation admits of some general information. The Italian expedition is encountering immense difficulties.
