VICTORY FOR CZECH-SLOVAKS.

WASHINGTON, July 30. The capture by Czecho-Slovak forces of several cities in the Caucasus and a Black Sea port where two Russian warships were seized and a stea mer sunk, is reported in the Austrian semi-official newspaper Reichspost according to information received by here to-day. The warship guns were turned against the port of Nororosik where they were seized, the newspaper said, but no details as to the damage done were given. Cities captured include Staoroper. Sirjobriation and Michelovka while it was said that the Czech-Slovaks operating with the Russian White Guards, had occupied benefit.
