In the early stages of the campaign now on, many of the Liberal voters who fought under the leadership of Sir Robert Bond in past elections, hesitated in regard to the attitude they should assume when polling day arrived. pede the men he deemed so obtuse into casting their votes for Coaker and Squires. The publication likewise, shows that Squires and his two editors also put Newfoundlanders into the same class of stupidity as W. D. Reid, but we know our countrymen too well to believe that they are so going to degrade their intelligence as to be hoodwinked thus by W. D. Reid, Coaker and Squires. The contempt manifested by W. D. Reid towards the intelligence of Newfoundlanders and the connivance therewith by Coaker and Squires and their editors, is probably the most colossal piece of impudence ever inflicted upon our people. To tolerate it by supporting the Coaker-Squires candidates would be an endorsement of the reflection they place upon our mental capacity, so it is incumbent therefore to hurl out of sight for ever in this country any political parties who would ever again dare to face an outraged and insulted electorate, such as those now being trotted out for our votes by Coaker and Squires.
