**Derelict Reported.**

**"SABLE L" PASSES VESSEL BOTTOM UP.**

The captain of the Sable Island reports that at 10:30 this morning he passed a vessel bottom up about 6 miles due South of Cape Spear. The sea was very rough at the time and the heavy boats carried by the ship could not be launched to ascertain the name of the derelict. The vessel, so the captain says, appeared to be a new one about 200 tons and is painted white, two spars are floating alongside having evidently been broken off from the deck. She was down by the head and showed fifty feet of her keel, but the seas breaking over her prevented the name from being ascertained. Capt. Murley thinks the upturned hull has three masts. A boom, broken in two places, was sticking up alongside, entangled in the wreckage. No bodies or sign of life was seen.

**Coal Seam Widening.**

Late advice received by the Manager from the St. George's Coal Fields state that some 30 inches of coal had been cut in the Diamond Seam, at first opened at a foot and one inch in width. The indications are that, according to they continue into the solid ground, it will run into a six feet seam, as the walls on either side are exactly six feet apart and run parallel for miles. This will probably be one of the mother seams, as it will apparently underlay the whole property. Work on the Howley Seam is also progressing favorably and it is now expected that, by another month or so, the whole of this property will be ready for inspection.

**Snapshots.**

The champion tennis player of Norway, Molla Bjursted, has married Franklin L. Mallory, a New York stock broker, and so becomes an American stepmother. They met on a train going to Palm Beach, one seeking rest, the other after the tennis championship of Florida. She came to America in 1914 and failed. Her first winter here she lived on \$6 a week. Her husband is a man of wealth.

Patrick O'Connor, who is at present in South Africa, is stated to be the biggest man on earth. A veritable modern Hercules, O'Connor is almost 5 feet high, and a person 6 feet 6 inches high can walk beneath his arms when outstretched horizontally. He has a chest measurement of 55 inches and weighs 357 pounds, while the ring which adorns the index finger of the giant's right hand is so large that a half-dollar can pass easily through it.

Arnold Bennett's first literary earnings came in the form of a guinea prize for the best humorous condensation of a story in Tit-Bits. At that time he was a shorthand clerk earning 25s. a week. He began to write articles. "When I received a postal order from the first one," he says, "I saw the world opening before me like a flower." At that time however, his literary earnings amounted to about 3d. an hour. Now they are estimated at about 50 pounds an hour.

Sir Arthur Currie, commanding the Canadian Corps, who has recently been promoted and made Inspector General in Canada, is fond of telling the following story. "In the early days of the war," says Sir Arthur, "an old farmer living way back on the far Western prairies was feeling rather out of sorts, and sent his 18 year old son, George, to the nearest settlement, 10 miles distant, for a sedlitz powder. Arrived there, George promptly enlisted. He fought right through the war, was twice wounded, rose to commissioned rank, and returned recently to the farm, his breast covered with medals and decorations, including the V.C. and the French Croix de Guerre. "Well, dad?" concluded the returned hero, after briefly and modestly recounting his exploits. Then the old man replied: "George," he said, "what have you done with my sedlitz powder?"

**The Bank of England In Danger.**

There are no fewer than seven distinct occasions on which the Bank of England has come very near to failing, but perhaps the most critical period in its history followed the scare which was raised by the expectation of a French invasion in 1797. Parliament found it necessary to sanction the suspension of cash payments until six months after the signatures of a treaty of peace. These were not resumed until 1823, and in the meantime notes fell to a discount, varying between ten and twenty-five per cent. In 1825, during the great panic which brought down 770 banks, a run on the Bank of England began, but, fortunately, there was just sufficient gold in hand to meet it.

Since 1844, when the Bank Act was passed with the intention of making the recurrence of these financial difficulties an impossibility, the Bank has been hard pressed three times—in 1847, during the panic which followed the railway mania in 1857, during another panic which was brought about by failures on the other side of the Atlantic; and, lastly, in 1866. On each of these occasions the Bank was only saved by suspension of the Bank Act.

**Where Prohibition Hils.**

From an official of one of our large savings banks I have this significant statement:

"The gain in our deposits since July 1st is the largest in the bank's history. This is the more curious, since there had been a large decrease in deposits due to the withdrawal of funds to purchase Liberty bonds."

This banker would not say whether the "dry" law that went into effect on July 1st was the cause of this great gain in deposits. Rather he said he didn't know, but of the fact there is no doubt.
