A CHRISTMAS PRESENT.

VIENNA, Dec. 17.—The
Vienna will have bread for Christ-
mas, it is hoped, as the result of
measures taken yesterday by the Su-
preme Council for the relief of Austria.

WILL IT BE CHEAPER OR—
WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.

By a vote of 255 to 34, the House
yesterday passed a Senate Bill con-
tinuing the Sugar Equalization Board,
102 amendments, retaining in force
the war-time powers of the Govern-
ment for controlling prices and move-
ments of sugar were approved neces-
sitating the sending of measure to
conference circles of the two houses.

POLES NEW CABINET.

WARSAW, Dec. 17.—
A new Polish Cabinet, to succeed
that headed by Ignace Paderewski as
Premier and Foreign Minister, has
been constituted with Smulski as
Premier.

GOVERNMENT TO BLAME.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—
When T. P. O'Connor moved the ad-
journment of the House last night,
over the reading of the Freeman's
Journal, the debate became hampered
by an announcement by James Ian
MacPherson, Chief Secretary for Ire-
land, who hoped that members would
remember that the question was sub-
judice. Mr. O'Connor declared that
these acts of provocation in Ireland
were the result of a plot to prevent a
settlement of Irish questions and the
reconstruction of the Irish people. He
implored the house to realize the
tragedy of this sad policy. William
Adamson, Labor leader of the Associa-
tion Labor Party, with emotion, de-
clared that while his party had no
sympathy with the serious crimes
perpetrated in Ireland, they believed
that the Government's frequent resort
to methods of repression had a close
connection with these crimes. Mr.
O'Connor's motion for adjournment
was defeated by 161 to 85. Winston
Spencer Churchill, Secy. for War an-
nounced in the House yesterday that
the Germans had turned over to the
Allies 500 guns, 25,000 machine guns,
5,000 trench mortars and 1,700 air-
planes. They had still failed to de-
liver 42 locomotives and 47,600 rails.

the famous Baby Irene case, declar-
ing that Baby Irene was the daughter
of Marjorie Ryan, and not the child
of Mrs. Matters. At the same time
the judge directs that the baby be not
removed from the present jurisdiction,
until the time has elapsed for the ap-
peal of the case. In his judgment, His
Lordship roundly scores Dr. Brouard,
and says the physician "degraded an
honorable profession to the infamy of
kidnapping and baby snatching."

History of the Case.

Ottawa, Dec. 10.—Mrs. Dolly Led-
gewood Matters is the widow of the
late Frederick Matters, a Chicago con-
tractor who left a fortune of upwards
of a quarter of a million dollars. Mat-
ters died on January 4, 1914. Mrs.
Matters came to Ottawa in June of
the same year and returned to Chi-
cago, claiming to have given birth to
the female child she brought home
with her. As Matters had died without
leaving a will, she sought administra-
tion of the estate on behalf of herself
and child as she sole heirs. Relatives
of the dead man contested the claim,
bringing up the question of the mo-
therhood of the child and claiming
Mrs. Matters was only entitled to the
widow's share under the laws of the
State.

A charge of conspiracy was laid
against Mrs. Matters in the Chicago
Criminal Courts and after a lengthy
hearing Mrs. Matters was acquitted.
Then Margaret Ryan, of Ottawa, ap-
peared on the scene and was success-
ful in claiming possession of the child
under a writ of habeas corpus in the
Court of Federal Judge Landis, and
brought the child to Ottawa. Mrs.
Matters later appealed Judge Landis'
decision and the United States Court
of Appeals decided in her favor. How-
ever, the child was outside the juris-
diction of the United States Courts
and the Ryan girl refused to give it
up.

Then followed Mrs. Matters, sensa-
tional attempts at kidnapping of this
summer, the laying of a charge still
pending of attempted kidnapping and
her subsequent institution of the
habeas corpus proceedings in the
Supreme Court of the Province of On-
tario, just concluded by the judgment
of Justice Lennox.

What Is An Infant?

(From the Saskatoon Phoenix.)
What is an infant? It took four
magistrates, a select group of law-
yers and finally the Lord Chief Jus-
tice and two other Judges to decide
this knotty problem in England, re-
cently. The baby was being carried
in arms and with its parent it en-
tered a taxicab. The driver demanded
payment for two; it was contended
there was only one legal passenger—
result, a lawsuit. The suit involved the
enormous amount of five cents, but
it must have cost a thousand dollars to
get it settled. The baby won; it ob-
viously could not occupy a seat, so the
law placed all the transportation
facilities of the United Kingdom at
its service, free, gratis, and for no-
thing. It may be doubted, however,
whether the baby really appreciated this
glorious privilege.

What Makes a
Cold Glass Crack

IF WE PUT HOT WATER INTO IT!
Hot water will not always cause a
cold glass to crack, but is very apt
to, especially a thick glass. The test
tubes used by chemists are made of
very thin glass, and will not crack
when hot liquids are poured into
them.

When a glass cracks after you have
poured a hot liquid into it, it does so
because, as soon as the hot liquid is
put in, the particles of glass which
form the inside of the glass become
heated and expand. They begin to do
this before the particles which form
the outside of the glass become heated,
and in their efforts to expand the in-
side particles of glass literally break
away from the particles which form
the outside, causing the crack. The
same thing happens if you put cold
water into a hot glass excepting in
this instance the inside particles of
the glass contract before the particles
which form the outside of the glass
have had time to become cool and do
likewise.
