MONTREAL CITY HALL DESTROYED.

MONTREAL, March 4. In a spectacular blaze, that lit up the whole centre of the city from around midnight until three this morning, Montreal City Hall was practically destroyed by a fire, which called forth, at one in the morning, the whole of the available fire fighting force of the city to combat it. A property loss of a million dollars is involved, and in addition, \$5,000,000 signed debentures, recently raised on a city loan may also be lost, since it was not absolutely certain that they were lying in fire proof safety vaults.

KEMAL PASHA RULES.

ATHENS, March 4. Mustafa Kemal Pasha has been re-elected head of the Turkish Nationalist Government, by the National Assembly, says an Ankara despatch received here.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 4. The Green Crescent Turkish Committee, organized to fight the use of alcohol as a beverage, is making a drive for prohibition in Turkish capitals. Temperance lectures are being delivered by Professors and moving pictures, showing the results of intemperance, screened.

AS IT IS IN FUME.

FIUME, March 4. The Committee of National Defence proclaimed the final overthrow of the Provisional Government and Constituent Assembly yesterday. The Government capitulated after fierce fighting. The committee, upon assuming power, asked the Italian Government to send a representative to administer the Government of the city until quiet is restored.

NO TRANSLATION.

LONDON, March 4. The Imperial War Graves Commission has decided to refuse all applications for the removal of bodies of soldiers from graves in war the agree in France to Great Britain. Such action, the Commission claims, would be opposed to the policy of equality by treatment to the fallen, which have been adopted, and strongly supported by the public some time ago.

GERMAN PRAISE FOR LLOYD GEORGE.

BERLIN, March 4. The hope that the present political crisis in England would not cause the disappearance of Premier Lloyd George was expressed by Paul Loebe, President of the Reichstag, here yesterday. Herr Loebe described Mr. Lloyd George as "the strongest moving spirit" among Entente statesmen, and a man who realizes that Europe cannot be rehabilitated until the German reparations question is placed on a different basis. "Mr. Lloyd George is a statesman, who most energetically advocated the co-operation of the nation's economic questions. I hope he will succeed in the work he began with such clear-sighted intentions," he added.

Norse Legend Attacked.

LAND-MARK NOT MARKLAND.

HALIFAX, N.S.—Moses H. Nickerson, Commissioner of Fisheries for Nova Scotia, takes a tilt at the legend that Norsemen in the eleventh or twelfth century gave Nova Scotia the name Markland, because it was a wooded country. Mr. Nickerson who is master of seven or more languages, declares that the word mark in the Norse language was never used to denote a forest. A German, Father Adam of Bremen, was responsible for the legend, according to Mr. Nickerson. Copying the Norse sagas, he wrote: "Ey a land-suthr undan landinu ok fundu their thar bjarn-dyr, ok koluthu Bjarnar; en landit kolluthu their Mark-land, thar er skoggrinn var." This has been translated: "An island, lay to the southwest from under the land, and they found there a bear and called it Bear Land, but the land they called Markland because it was wooded."

According to Mr. Nickerson the last part of this sentence was incorrectly copied from the original Saga of Erik the Red, and should have read: "They called it a Land-mark, because it was wooded." This raises the question of what part of Canada first acquired an European name. If the Norse legend is excluded the honor evidently belongs to Cape Breton. Basque fishermen from the Gulf of Gascogne, France, gave that island its name in memory of Cape Breton, north of Bayonne. According to Fournier's Traite d'Hydrographie, published in Paris in 1657, Basque whale hunters and cod fishermen were making voyages to the isles of the Baccaloes of Newfoundland and Cape Breton—a hundred years before the voyage of Columbus. Fournier also relates a story that a Basque pilot was blown to the island of Dominica in the West Indies in the year 1490. On his return, after losing most of his crew by scurvy, this pilot lodged with Christopher Columbus, then making charts in Terceira, Madeira. Fournier wrote:
