

HOUSE OF COMMONS.  
OTTAWA, April 15.  
Sir John A. Macdonald moved that a humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to return His Excellency the thanks of this House for his gracious message, to assure His Excellency that they deeply participate in the severe loss the country has sustained in consequence of the murder of the Hon. Thomas D'Arcy McGee, member of Parliament for the electoral district of Montreal West, of which most atrocious act they cannot in terms sufficiently strong express their abhorrence; and being desirous of marking their sense of the public and private virtues of Mr. McGee, and of affording relief and assistance to his afflicted family, they beg leave to assure His Excellency that they shall feel it a grateful act of public duty, under the melancholy circumstances of this afflictive case, to enable His Excellency to make such provision for the widow and family of the Hon. Thos. D'Arcy McGee as may be consistent with the justice and liberality of Parliament. He said he did not think any remarks were required in support of the resolution he had just moved. The feeling of the country had been most unmistakably expressed in the eulogistic and universal wail which had passed over it from one end to the other. The feeling was unanimous that Parliament would be wanting in its duty to the country if provision for the widow and family of Mr. McGee were not made by the public. (Hear, hear.)  
Mr. Holton, Mr. McKenzie and others made brief speeches, heartily concurring in the motion, which was carried. The House will resolve itself into committee of the whole to-morrow.

Mr. Sprout inquired whether provision would be made in the estimates for the payment of the proportion due by the Government for alterations and additions made in the gaol of the County of Bruce.  
Sir John A. Macdonald said this was a matter which belonged altogether to the Government of Ontario, and the fund out of which such a payment might be had had been handed over to that government.  
Hon. Mr. Holton inquired if any information had been received from the survey party sent out to procure further information respecting the proposed Intercolonial Railway.  
Hon. Mr. McDougall said that to his knowledge no information such as that alluded to had been received by the Government.  
The House went into Committee of Supply, when the item of \$19,750 for the Department of Militia came up, objection was made by Mr. McKenzie and others to the appointment of a Deputy Minister of Militia as unnecessary. The item was, however, agreed to. Several other items were also passed when the committee rose and reported progress and obtained leave to sit again on Thursday.

**Interview between John McGee and Whalen.**  
On Wednesday afternoon Mr. John McGee had an interview with Whalen. John McGee is brother to Thos. D'Arcy McGee. Mr. John McGee was accompanied to the gaol by Mr. O'Rielly and others. When the party came opposite Whalen's cell, Mr. McGee, who was foremost, was at once addressed by the prisoner, who said—"Ah! John McGee, I know you; we have met before." Mr. McGee at once recognized Whalen, and said they had met before in his late brother's house there was no hesitation or reservation in the prisoner's manner at all. As to Mr. John McGee's wishing to see Whalen, it arose in this way—last New Year's day, a person called at Mr. D'Arcy McGee's residence in Montreal, and said he wished to see Mr. McGee. On the day in question the man who called was shown up stairs to Mr. Jno. McGee, brother of deceased, and this visitor finding he could not obtain an audience of the deceased statesman, told some sort of half-hesitating and very doubtful looking story about a number of men in Montreal having banded together to burn Mr. McGee's residence that day week, and then left the house. The story was not at the time regarded as probable, and since the assassination, it occurred to Jno. McGee that possibly the man who visited his brother's house had not told his real errand there. The statements made since Mr. John McGee's arrival confirm fully what we have previously stated the deceased statesman long anticipated a violent end. The information given by his relatives confirms the statements. The warning he received on more than one occasion in Quebec, the threatening letters and intimations he had received there were some who entertained feelings of the most intense animosity towards him, such feelings as might naturally be expected to eventuate in the assassination which recently ended Mr. McGee's career.

The city of Ottawa is swarming with detectives, among whom is the celebrated Allan Pinkerton of Chicago.

A newspaper has already made its appearance in Alaska. It is called the *Alaska Herald*, and is printed in Russian and English.  
A correspondent writes to *L'Italie*, a Florence paper, from Rome, that the pontifical army is losing what it has gained in numerical importance by reinforcement. Upwards of one hundred have deserted from the legion of Antibes Zouaves, Carabiniers, or Artillery, within the last twenty days.  
The farmers in the West are beginning to plant forest trees on their prairie lands as a protection for their dwellings against the cold northern blasts in winter, and to obtain a supply of fuel and timber.  
At Peoria, Ill., last week, a hog ran into a house and seized an infant from a cradle and ran off with it. The animal was about devouring the babe, when the mother and a few neighbors drove it off.  
A RITUALISTIC TRIAL.—The celebrated case which has been some time pending in the London Court of Arches, to test the legality of the ritualistic practices introduced by the Rev. Mackonochie at St. Alban's Church, Holborn, has been decided, and the judgment is upon the whole unfavorable to the ritualists, though like most legal judgments upon church matters, it will probably not be very effectual. Mr. Mackonochie is forbidden to mix water with wine 'for an appreciable time,' or to toss his censer toward 'persons or things,' yet he may burn incense as much as he pleases, may perform a slight elevation of the host, and may use lighted candles on the communion table. The charge of 'excessive kneeling,' which had also been brought against the reverend gentleman, the Court prudently declines to pass upon, but refers it to the judgment of the Bishop. On the whole, the trial seems to have left ritualism about where it was before.  
The destruction of the famous dragon tree of Tenerife—almost one of the wonders of the world—during a severe gale last autumn, is exciting the lamentations of botanists and tree lovers. The circumference of its trunk was about 78 feet; its height only 75 feet. It has been made memorable by the account given of it by Baron Humboldt, who estimated its age at about 6,000 years.
