Winnipeg Wholesale House Burnt.  
Winnipeg, April 28.—The six storey warehouse of Foley Bros. & Co., wholesale grocers, was destroyed today by fire. The loss is \$125,000, covered by insurance.

New York, April 28.—The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court decided today that Harry K. Thaw should not be transferred to another asylum.

HORSES AND HOUSEHOLD EFFECTS BURNED AT NANTON  
A Carload Belonging to a Settler Was Burned on the Tracks.  
Nanton, April 28.—A carload of effects belonging to Andrew Landies, which were being loaded for shipment north, was burned last night just after 12 o'clock. The car was very nearly loaded, and contained all the household furniture, farm implements and machinery, eleven head of horses and one cow. Mr. Landies' loss is approximately \$17,000.

Mr. Landies has been laid up with a broken leg for the past two months, and can only walk with the aid of crutches. The men who were assisting him were working late to finish loading for shipment north. The train reached here about midnight and the loading was not quite completed; but only a few chickens remained to be placed. Those loading the car necessarily were using lanterns. One was holding a lantern while another was nailing a board in place, when the train, backing in on the sidetrack, bumped against the car, jolting the men in the car so that the one who held the lantern lost his hold on it, and it dropped to the floor, rolling under the feet of the horses and was broken. The oil ignited and spread through the straw and floor, and the car was quickly in flames. An effort was made to get some of the horses out, but the fire was too rapid. One saddle pony that was gotten out was so badly burned that it is blind, and will be killed. Another horse broke its neck while men were trying to get him out. The remaining nine horses and the cow were burned.

The burning car was pulled up the track away from the loading platform, the elevator and coal houses, and left where it burned.

Among the horses burned to death was the valuable shire stallion Holt King which Mr. Landies imported from England in 1908, and was valued at \$3,000. Mr. Landies was removing to the Red Deer country, and was shipping to Brooks, from where he intended to drive across the country to his new location. His departure was delayed a month by his broken leg, but he was well equipped for starting in the new country; but by his misfortune last night everything was swept away but his land in the north.
