UNION JACK OVER TING HAL.

Admiral Seymour Has Made Very Important Move.

The British Admiral Has Seized on the Island of Chusan and Has Warships te Back Rim Up-The Move Is in Keeping With the Open Door Policy Position Commands the Yang Tse Klang River.

London, Nov. 28.—Admiral Seymour, commanding the British squadron in Chinese waters, has hoisted the British flag over Tring Hai, capital of the Island of Chusan, and has stationed a formidable fleet of warships in that vicinity to detend his action.

able fleet of warships in that vicinity to defend his action.

The Chusan group forms one of the most strategic positions on the Chirese coast. Britain's now possession commands the mouth of the Yang Tse Kiang River, the great artery of Central China, and the most densely populated region of its size in the world. The various mouths of the river are just north of Chusan.

The entire Yang Tse Kiang Valley, by a recent treaty between Great Britain and China, has been placed within the British sphere of influence, China agreeing not to allenate it to any other power. Near the mouth of the river is Shanghai, the greatest commercial city of

Near the mouth of the river is Snanghai, the greatest con mercial city of China, and within a couple of hundred miles are Suchay and hair a dozen other cities, having an average population of little less than a million.

The coast provinces of Kiang Sl and Che Kiang, opposite Chusan, have a combined population of probably more than 60,000,000.

The Report Not Credited. Shanghai, Nov. 28.—The report received here on Saturday that the British admiral had heisted the Union Jack over Ting Hai, capital of the Island of Chuan, and over several other islands in the Chusan archipelago, is not credited. The British consulate has received no confirmation of the rumor, which prob-ably originated in mistaking the survey marks of the survey ship Water Witch for the Union Jack.

THE FRENCH CAULDRON.

The Impending Conflict Between Civil and Military Power May Yet Materialize in Strife.

Paris, Nov. 28.—France, after all, is not to escape the crisis which has been impending for many months, namely, a decisive conflict between the civil authorities and the military power. The action of Gen. Zurlinden, the Military Governor of Paris, in ordering Col. Picquart before of Paris, in ordering Col. Picquart before a court-martial, is nothing less than a monstrous plot to defeat justice and establish the supremacy of the army above the Republican institutions in France.

The apprehensions which were aroused in the nutdle of October by the discovery

The apprehensions which were aroused in the middle of October by the discovery of a military plot for a coup d'etat are now revived with greater force, and the Dreyfus affair is dwarfed in the face of this new infamy and national danger. It has been said that the men who are fighting Picquart are fighting with ropes around their necks, and they will not stick at trifles. Therein lies the peril of the situation, for Gens. Mercler, Gonse, Boisedfire and Zurlinden, controlling as Boisdefre and Zurlinden, controlling as they do all of the military forces of Paris, have power to, at any moment, selze the Government and establish a dic-tatorship which will to only overthrown after great bloodshed.

Lockroy Modifies His Program Paris, Nov. 28.—M. Lockroy's naval program for the year 1899 has been modified at the last moment, and all of the proposed new bathleships have been climinated. Altogether 48 ships have been added to the navy for 1899 and 21 for 1900. France will then have more torsides and torned destroyers than Great bedoes and torpedo destroyers than Great

London, Nov. 28.—Dr. Robertson Nicolls writes in the British Weekly of a startling state of affairs in the literary world. He says:

"I have evidence in my possession which shows that organized conspiracies exist to destroy the reputation of certain books and authors—cliques, of which certain journalists are at the head." Owing to the high standing of Dr. Nicolls, this statement has produced a great sensation in literary circles in London. The Academy reprints the accusation under the title "Breakers Ahead."
