THE WEATHER PROPHECY.
Toronto, May 21—11 p.m.—The depression which was west of the lake last night has moved with diminishing energy to the St. Lawrence Valley, causing showers in Ontario and Quebec, and numerous thunder storms on the south shores of the lake. There is another small depression moving northward across the Missouri Valley, accompanied by heavy rain. Fine, warm weather has prevailed in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 35°-75°; Prince Albert, 34°-74°; Battleford, 40°-75°; Winnipeg, 35°-64°; Toronto, 55°-71°; Montreal, 59°-71°; Quebec, 50°-70°; Halifax, 45°-70°.

Local temperature.—Highest, 77°; lowest, 62°.

The Late John Duncan.
John Duncan, one of the oldest farmers
in East Williams, died suddenly by Tues-
day morning last after a comparatively
short illness. Deceased, who was a native
of Aberdeenshire, Scotland, came to town-
ship about 40 years ago, and took up land
on the south side of the Shabell River, near
Springbank. He has lived ever since,
with the exception of a short time when he
rented his land, and engaged in the oil
business in London. He was a man of
quiet, unobtrusive habits, and never
took a very active part in public
life, but he was one of the best informed
men in the district, and could, if he had de-
sired, have secured public honors. For some
time he had been ailing from an internal
affection, but he was able to overcome the
work on his farm up to the day before his
death, and the end was alarmingly sudden.
Deceased was brother to Mrs. Samuel Wil-
kins, of this city; Mr. Andrew Duncan,
Springbank; Mr. Wm. Duncan, Michigan; and
Mrs. Lumsden, Aberdeenshire. He was in
his 60th year, and was twice married. He
is survived by a widow (formerly Miss
Stewart) and seven of a family, who will
have the sympathy of a wide circle of
friends.

Crop Prospects in Kent.
J. J. Spettigue, an esteemed citizen of
London, who has been visiting in Kent
county nearly two months, writes from
Cedar Springs as follows: "With regard to
the crops in this part, I find on the Ridge
reaching almost all the way from the Eau
through to Blenheim, Cedar Springs and on
to Leamington in Essex, there has been
no growth for the last two or
three weeks; in fact the fall wheat is
suffering for want of rain; but as
you go north towards Chatham it has not
suffered very little. The land is deeper and
holds the moisture longer. I was quite sur-
prised to have seen an article in the Adven-
turer two weeks since stating that the fruit
crop had suffered almost total destruction.
Nothing could be more misleading or further
from the truth. On the contrary, I am told
by many old settlers that there never
has been a more promising appearance for
twenty years than at the present time in
all kinds of fruit, excepting apples, which
are not, from present appearances, likely
to be an average crop, particularly the later
fruit, such as russets, etc."
