KENNEL.

The International Field Trials Club announces that it will give its eighth annual trials at Mitchell's Bay, commencing Tuesday, Nov. 15, and lasting probably three or four days. Two events will be contested. They are the international derby for the young dogs—pointers and setters—whipped after Jan. 1, 1896. So far fifteen owners have paid their second forfeits, and it is expected that at least twelve dogs will compete for the prizes. The other and principal event will be the all-aged stake, open to all pointers and setters. In addition to the prizes the winner will be awarded an international cup donated four years ago by a leading Canadian sportsman. The cup will become the property of the kennel or owner winning it three times. It does not follow that the cup must be won three times consecutively. The trophy has been won twice by Bangham's splendid dog Dash Antonio, owned in Windsor. Mr. Davey, of London, has been a winner with Brighton Tobe, and W. B. Wells, of Chatham, who owns what is considered one of the most valuable kennels in the country, is hopeful that he can win it again with one of his fine lot, Cleopatra won the honor for his kennel once. Every legitimate effort will be made to beat Dash Antonio, who by some good judges is regarded as a certain winner. It is expected fifteen dogs at least will be in the stake.

FOOTBALL.

LONDON TEAM FOR SATURDAY. A London special to the Toronto Globe says: Gibson, the old 'Varsity player, is to play center half-back for London on Saturday against 'Varsity II, in Toronto. The Forest City team will play with three men off their regular team. Frank Reid's dislocated elbow will bar him from the game this season; Evans is shooting big game up in Muskoka, and Stringer says he is too busy writing sonnets and things to think of football. Pte. Hawthorne, of Wolseley Barracks, who tips the scales at 200, and is in the pink of condition, will play on the scrimmage, providing he can obtain leave of absence from the barracks. BASEBALL.

INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE PROPOSED.

Port Huron Times: J. A. Murphy, manager of the Bay City baseball team, is spending a few days in Port Huron. Mr. Murphy is anxious to form an international league for next season, which will include the cities of London, Guelph, St. Thomas, Port Huron, Saginaw, and Bay City. He believes that a league made up from the above cities would be successful from the start. Mr. Murphy has interviewed a large number of gentlemen interested in baseball and has reason to believe that an association will be organized. A meeting of representatives from each of the above towns will be held in this city about Nov. 15 to take action in the matter of organizing a league.

ATLANTIC MAIL SERVICE.

The Beaver Line of Steamers Get the Contract.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The contract for carrying the British mails has been awarded by the cabinet, and all that is now wanted is the signature of the Beaver Steamship Line, to which the contract has been given to complete the matter. The company is to receive the full amount of annual subsidy, viz., \$100,000 per annum, and give a weekly service between St. John and Liverpool, calling at Halifax both coming and going. The \$20,000 voted for a fortnight freight service to the company is embodied in the larger amount.

The only point to be settled before the contract is signed is for the Beaver Line people to make satisfactory arrangements about freight with the C. P. R. on the basis of the enlarged service. During the summer season the service will be between Montreal or Quebec and Liverpool.

TRAGEDY NEAR SIMCOE

A Young Man Fatally Shot—His Body Located by His Faithful Dog.

Simcoe, Ont., Nov. 4.—Anthony Chanda, aged 19 years, living with his father in the township of Charlotteville, six miles from here, was instantly killed by the accidental discharge of his gun while he was in the woods shooting. One barrel of his muzzle-loading shotgun had been discharged, and he was reloading it when the second barrel went off, and the top of Chanda's head was blown off by the charge. The only witness to the accident was Chanda's 12-year-old brother, who was so strung by the sight, that after he had obtained help from the house, he could not find his way to the fatal spot. The body was located by the unfortunate young man's dog.

## Wrote as He Died

Messages to Loved Ones He Was Leaving.

The Dead Mine Foreman's Story Completed by the Survivor—Last Words to His Wife.

Swanton, Pa., Nov. 3.—One chapter of the death of Sunday's disaster in the Van Storch mine slope comes as a message from the dead, one of the six men who lost their lives by the terrible fire that raged in the shaft having written in his living tomb a chronicle of the events immediately preceding his death. Seven men were imprisoned by the wall of flame and smoke that drove back those who risked life to save them. What the imprisoned miners did from the time they found themselves hemmed in is told in the memoranda left by Foreman Thomas Hill, and where his story breaks off, as he topples over to die of suffocation, it is taken up by Joseph Yankowski, who was taken out of the burning pit alive.

STORY OF DEATH.

Foreman Hill's memoranda, furnished yesterday by Superintendent Zeigler, says: "I was at the fire boss' shanty at 11:30 on the night of the 29th. Everything was all right. At 1:30 on the 30th was coming out. Could not make any further than the place known as Tully's (door tended by a boy named Tully). All well at 2:15. All well and in good spirits at 2:30. All alive at 3:25. We are beginning to get discouraged now. Tried to get out at 3:45. Pretty near gone. McDonnell and Moran came and helped us out. Came to assist Tully's gate. If they had not come to our assistance we would have been without lights. Our lives went out with black damp. All alive at 7 o'clock, but have small hopes. All alive at 8 o'clock. All feeling sick. All alive at 9. Was out at Tully's gate at 9:30; no black damp there, but more smoke. At 10 o'clock still living; feeling little better than we were at 9. Was at Tully's at 11. Smoke strong. We are in Moffitt's. (Chamber worked by miner named Moffitt)."

The final message was posted on a board, on which was chalked: "We have gone to the dip." The "dip" was a low spot in the new Diamond vein, in which water accumulated, and which the men were working on to keep clear. None reached the "dip" but Yankowski, Walsh died on the plane that led from the Diamond to the four-foot; Moran died at the foot of the plane, and the four others within the next 50 feet.

LAST WORDS TO HIS WIFE.

On Hill was also found a letter to his wife and four little daughters, written at 8:30 in the morning, telling them there was no hope of his ever again seeing them alive; that death was but a short way off. He bade them send affectionate farewells, and his letter was filled with deep pathos that told how his heart ached at the dreadful parting. He said he would die praying for them, and he probably kept his word, for he was found with clasped hands on bended knees.

THE STORY VERIFIED.

Yankowski says Foreman Hill, after the retreat from the slope fire, started with the men from the plane leading to the four-foot vein. They tried to climb the incline of three hundred feet, but were forced back to the Diamond vein by the smoke. Had they gotten into the four-foot vein they would have escaped the smoke, and an airway, in which were ladders leading back to the Diamond at a point beyond the fire, and from which they could have reached the shaft and been saved. They made repeated attempts to scale the plane, but failed. Then they forced Tully's gate, and among them sank, plunged the crooks, but the smoke forced this, and they retreated into Moffitt's chamber.

trying the same means to keep out the smoke. Then the efforts to reach the "dip" was made.

FIGHT WITH DEATH.

Yankowski alone got there, and getting hold of the hand fan, he created an air current that sustained him until his rescuers arrived. He had, at intervals, however, gotten to various miners' boxes, securing small bits of food and oil. He also got a quantity of oats, and these he stored near his fan, and felt prepared to fight off death for several days. He said just before the men succumbed they were joking with each other about what they would first do when they got out, and that their final greeting as they fell was "Good-bye, Butties."
