In Sporting Circles

Annual Meeting of the Eastern Baseball League.

Standing of the Clubs — Disputed Games Disposed Of.

Prospective Tour of the Winnipeg Hockey Club—Basket Ball in Petrolia—Odds and Ends of Sport.

BASEBALL.

EASTERN LEAGUE MEETING.

New York, Dec. 2.—The annual meeting of the Eastern League of professional baseball clubs was called to order in the city yesterday by President P. T. Powers. Among the questions which came up for discussion was the right of the National League to draft the players. The consensus of opinion among the Eastern League managers seemed to be in favor of securing the privilege to hold a player two years instead of one, after his services have been demanded by the National League. The make-up of the circuit for next year was also discussed. Among those present at the meeting were: James Franklin, Buffalo, and Arthur Irwin, Toronto; George N. Kuntze, Syracuse; G. W. Cameron, J. C. Mackie, and C. A. O'Neill, Montreal; Thomas R. Brooks, C. H. P. Simpson, Scranton; F. Bogart, L. W. Long, C. W. Tarnany and Dan Shanahan, Toronto; Tom Burns and C. T. Shea, Springfield; W. H. Draper, J. N. Battery and William Murray, Providence. The first action of the board of directors, composed of Messrs. Powers, Franklin, Kuntze, Bogart and Draper, was to formally award the players' contracts for the coming season.

The board of directors, after their deliberations yesterday, gave out the following as the official standing of the clubs: Syracuse, Toronto, Buffalo, Springfield, Providence, Scranton, Montreal, Wilkes-Barre. The attention of the directors in the afternoon was directed to the settling of various protests on games. In each instance the original ruling of President Powers was upheld. The disputed games were: Montreal vs. Providence; Rochester vs. Syracuse, at Hamilton, Ont., July 1, two games, all of which were decided by the championship games, and Buffalo and Syracuse, July 9, which was awarded to Buffalo. The board of directors decided to hold a meeting at the Hamilton Hotel, Sept. 1, so that matters in dispute might be settled before the close of the season. It was decided also to permit the transfer of scheduled games from one city to another, on the consent of three-fourths of the clubs in the league or by mutual agreement of the managers, indorsed by the president.

After the adjournment of the board of directors' meeting the regular meeting of the league was held, but an adjournment taken until today. At this meeting Arthur Irwin will appear to answer charges against him. Irwin, a Toronto player really belonging to the Washington team of the National League, Irwin declares that there is no truth in the charges. The Washington club, he says, secured several of these players at the close of the season. Rochester and New Haven have made application for admission to the league, but their chances are said to be slight, Worcester having the call.
