Prof. Campbell protested against the decision, and declared his intention to appeal against it to the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. The ground of the appeal will be that the Presbytery in the consideration of the arguments upon which its decision was based failed to weigh the scriptural ones presented by the decision.
