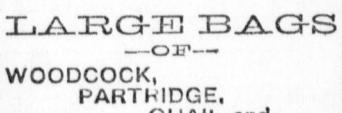

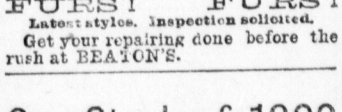

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Yesterday being All Souls' Day services were held in the various Catholic churches of the city.

—Mrs. Mary Wilkinson, of Adelaide street, who for a long time has been a resident of the city, was taken into custody yesterday afternoon on a charge of insanity.

—Joseph Tait, M. P. for Toronto, will preach the anniversary sermon in King Street Methodist Church, on Nov. 26. Mr. Tait has quite a reputation as a pulpit orator.

—One of the great charms of "Hendrick Hudson," in which Corinne and the Kismet Opera Company will appear at the Grand to-night, is the beautiful setting in the second act representing the overgrown of Florida. This is one of the prettiest settings ever seen on the stage, and is worth the price of admission alone.

Mr. D. H. Tennent, counsel for John T. Ottwell, is going to appear to the Secretary of State for an application to have the prisoner examined. At the trial yesterday a petition signed by a number of prominent citizens was read out, as the prisoner had pleaded guilty. Application was also made to admit evidence to prove that Ottwell, on account of his age, was not responsible for his acts.

—There was no quorum at the meeting of the board of works last evening—Ald. Carratt (chairman), Ald. Thomas Jones, Ald. Shaw, Assistant Engineer Ironsides and Secretary Bell only were present. Accounts amounting to \$229.42 were passed.

Mr. Charles Morton, a resident of Wexley road, was present complaining about a drain being built through his property. No action, of course, was taken.

—The remains of the late John Santo were taken from the family residence, 421 Matland street, yesterday afternoon and laid to rest at Woodlawn. The cortege was followed to the grave by a large number of sorrowing friends and many members of St. George's Society, of which deceased was an active member. The services were conducted by Rev. Canon Richardson. The pallbearers were: Messrs W. F. Bullen, Wm. Skinner, V. Conyn, H. Smyth, C. A. Jones and J. Evans.

The Convalescent Home.
For five years the Convalescent Home on York street has been doing a noble work—a work unique and indispensable to the city. The annual meeting was held yesterday afternoon. Ranged about the room were Mrs. Locant, Mrs. Labatt, Mrs. W. J. Reid, Mrs. Edge, Mrs. Lashbrook, Mrs. Bucke, members of the board; and Mrs. Moncrieff, Miss Smart, Mrs. Foxley, Mrs. Lawrence, Mrs. Magee, Mrs. W. Hayes, Mrs. E. Cleghorn, Rev. W. Shortt, Rev. J. A. Murray, visitors. Mrs. Strong, treasurer, and Miss Hamilton, secretary, were also present. The usual monthly report showed that there were six patients in the home at present. A donation of \$30 from an anonymous friend through Mrs. Bremner was gratefully acknowledged. The secretary's statement for the year which has just concluded was most encouraging. Twenty-nine patients in all had been admitted for various terms of residence—11 males and 18 female. A large proportion of these were great patients, but some of those who were able willingly paid. The total amount received in donations was \$149.80, all of which were voluntary. The council was thanked for its grant of \$100, as was also the Government in increasing its donation to \$250.05—an advance of \$82.80. The Convalescent Home is now placed upon a firm foundation. It has premises of its own and is fully incorporated. The advisory services of Mr. Gill, the late Sheriff Glass and Mr. Flock have been invaluable, and Doctors Niven, Arnott, Waugh, English, Drake and Hodge have rendered appreciated professional aid. The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$235.34. The total cost of maintenance was \$791.07. Out of the \$2,200 agreed upon as purchase money for the home's property, a fine brick structure, \$1,050 has already been paid. The receipts for the year, from all sources, amounted to \$1,576.41. The advantages of such an institution as the Convalescent Home cannot readily be estimated, and the grand work which has been accomplished only foreshadows better achievements in the future.

The regular Glencoe fall cattle fair was held on Mr. McCracker's farm, Main street, Wednesday. The stock offered amounted to 1,000 head, the largest in years. Prices ranged low, the highest paid being \$3.20 per hundredweight, and the lowest \$2.50. Very few choice export cattle were offered and but one or two sales were made. Fat hatching cattle were plentiful and sold readily, very few being taken home by the owners. Stockers were plentiful also, and a large number changed hands at fair prices. Some cattle, though present in abundance, were not in demand, very few sales being made, and prices poor.

Two unknown men went the other night to the residence of James Ewingham, Wardville, called him to the door and immediately began firing. Three shots were fired in rapid succession, one passing through Mr. Ewingham's coat sleeve, but fortunately not injuring him. His escape is marvellous, as the ruffians were but a few yards away.
