## Cabled Comment

Anti-British Outbreak in Germany—Urged  
That Continental Ports Be Closed  
Against British Goods.

The Dingley Bill Severely Felt in Germany—  
British Politics—A Tory Civil War—Lord  
Londonderry Denounces Government Measures—  
The Liberals Leaderless and Supine—British  
Telegraphers May Strike—Peter's Pence.

London, Aug. 7.—The cloudbursts and inundations which have devastated the eastern parts of Germany were the worst which have occurred since 1870. According to the local statistics, 165 persons were killed in Saxony alone, and in Saxony the casualties will not fall short of 180. The financial losses foot up over 150,000,000 marks. At Plinitz, the country residence of the Queen of Saxony, the River Elbe rose so fast that it flooded the lower floor of the royal castle, forcing the king and queen to hurriedly flee from the place and seek refuge at Dresden. Prince Hohenlohe, the imperial chancellor, who was then on his way from his estate at Aussig to Berlin, had to leave the train at Assig and was conveyed ten miles to a redoubt on the other side of the river. Through a landslide of the highest summit of the Silesian Mountains, the Hotel Schneekoppe was carried down and buried with all its occupants.

Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, has granted 20,000 marks as a private purse for the relief of the sufferers, and the Queen of Saxony has granted 20,000 marks for the same purpose. Emperor William of Germany has not yet made a donation to the people who have suffered from the floods, etc., in the eastern part of the country, although he has given 25,000 marks to the flood sufferers in Alsace. The newspapers are calling for special sessions of the reichstag and diet so that these bodies may make extraordinary grants of money for the relief of the suffering families; but, as the suggestion was first made by the Vorwarts and other Social newspapers, it is being discouraged by the government. The municipality of Berlin has granted 50,000 marks for the relief of the thousands of people rendered homeless and penniless by the storms, and the city of Dresden has voted 300,000 marks for the same good work.

## DINGLEY BILL HURTS GERMANY.

The German newspapers continue to discuss the new United States tariff, and to call for reprisals; but the Associated Press learns from the foreign office that the Government of Germany has no intention of beginning a tariff war. A high official of the foreign office said to the correspondent:

"There will be no tariff war, as Germany is too weak to carry it out, and because a large part of the American imports are necessities, as well as cotton and other raw materials are indispensable to our industry. The formation of a large continental tariff union with its ram, pointed at the United States, would miscarry because of England's opposition. As a matter of fact, our interest in the tariff is not so much to protect our industry as to protect our commerce. Baron von Thielmann (the German ambassador to the United States, who has been named as the German Count Posadowski-Wehner as imperial secretary of state for the treasury) though his advice and intimate knowledge of the American tariff and financial affairs would be of great help to us during the coming crisis, cannot change the facts in the case."

Palpable effects of the new tariff are already noticeable. The manufacturers of Solingen are lacking orders and many factories have reduced the number of employees. In the Cuban and Chinese markets, the already much industrial distress. Similar complaints are made elsewhere.

The Florists Association has sent a memorial to the imperial chancellor protesting against the tariff as seriously injuring the export trade of flowers and plants during the last few weeks.

## EMPEROR WILLIAM THREATENED.

Before starting for Russia, Emperor William received a number of threatening letters from Nihilists and Pan-Slavists. In consequence of this one of the shrewdest criminal commissioners, Dr. Henninger, with a section of the Berlin political police, was sent to Petrograd to accompany the emperor. The emperor will accompany him everywhere during his stay in Russia.

## JAPAN'S BATTLESHIP.

The Japanese Government has ordered from the Vulcan Works, in Germany a battleship of 8,900 tons, which is to cost 13,000,000 marks.

## RACE TRACK FATALITIES.

The past week has witnessed a number of fatal accidents on German race courses. Count von Feck, a wealthy gentleman rider, and at one time the friend of the Baroness von Feck, and Lieut. Beck, also a gentleman rider, were killed during a race at Kreuznach. At the Neuss races the most successful gentleman rider in Germany, Lieut. von Kayser was killed, and Capt. von Suernmordt was seriously injured. Two jockeys also met accidental deaths.

## A KIND ACT.

The Emperor of Germany recently discovered in a sailor of the Hohenzoellern, named Obermeyer, a native of Baden, a remarkable talent for painting and sketching, and his Majesty has sent him to the Art Academy of Berlin, charging himself with the sailor's education.

## GERMAN-AMERICAN MARKSMEN.

The Independent Schuetzen corps of New York, while at Coblenz, deposited a wreath upon the Empress Augusta Monument and telegraphed the fact to the Grand Duchess of Baden, daughter of the ex-Empress. The grand duchess sent a very appreciative acknowledgment to the corps. The German-American riflemen won several prizes at the Nuremberg national sharpshooting tournament.

## TORY CIVIL WAR THREATENED.

The close of the session of parliament has left the Tory party in an altogether enervated frame of mind. The latent antagonism of the different schools of ministerialists has threatened more than once during the past six months to bring about a civil

war in the Tory camp, and the recess leaves considerable numbers of Conservatives in a state of high indignation and resentment. The malcontents claim that the legislation has been reactionary and socialistic. Many of them are angry at what they declare to be a humiliating surrender of the national honor on the demand of America. The Marquis of Londonderry, representing the big class of Tory landlords, has been the cause of discomfiture by publishing a letter in which he practically cuts adrift from the Unionists, saying in so many words that he cannot stand the Irish land bills, nor Mr. Chamberlain's pet measure, the workmen's competency bill. The attitude of the Conservatives would never have been so open as it is to-day if it had been introduced by Mr. Chamberlain before the latter changed his politics. The members of the opposition are in no better mood. The rank and file are indifferent and quarrelsome, while the leaders seem to be lost in the shuffle. Lord Rosebery occasionally leaves his temporary retirement in order to make a humorous speech. Mr. Henry Fowler and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman are quiescent, while Mr. Herbert Asquith has been earning Tory cheers for his speeches in behalf of the workmen's compensation bill. Sir William Vernon Harcourt is alone visible, though Sir Henry Labouchere has tried to push to the front by issuing a manifesto early during the week, suggesting a new Liberal programme. His so-called "household" however, has been snubbed by the heads of the Liberal Federation, and his manifesto has fallen absolutely flat. As a matter of fact, the Liberal party seems opinionless, as well as leaderless. The conflict for the leadership of the party continues in spite of this far from hopeful outlook, and should the Liberals again be called to war the fight between Rosebery and Harcourt will undoubtedly be reopened.

## POLITICS ON THE CONTINENT.

The leading question in continental political circles is, will the visit of Emperor William of Germany to St. Petersburg result in a German-Russian-French understanding directed against Great Britain? Such a consummation is undoubtedly devoutly wished for by Germany, where the denunciation of the treaty of commerce between Great Britain and Germany has been met with a storm of indignation. The Deutsche Zeitung voices the general hope, saying: "The emperor will achieve imperishable renown if he succeeds in creating an alliance aiming at the annihilation of England's power." Continuing, the Deutsche Zeitung suggests that the emperor should endeavor to obtain the closing of the continental ports against English goods.

Paris, however, shows there is little enthusiasm there on the subject, the impression being that the emperor is entering into such an arrangement, is only playing Germany's game, and is very doubtful if France will derive any material advantage therefrom. On the other hand, Great Britain, judging from the tone of the press, is absolutely indifferent and is content to continue in her position of "splendid isolation," satisfied that either the Russian or French Government combination will receive her with open arms if she ever desires to join them.

## LIBERALS LEADERLESS.

London, Aug. 8.—The discussion of the work done in parliament during the session which closed yesterday has resulted in a complete demoralization of the Liberal party. The opposition, as far as the House of Commons is concerned, has ceased to have any but a nominal existence. This, despite the fact that the Salisbury Government by no means enjoys the popular support which gave it an enormous majority two years ago. The real seat of the trouble is the upper council of the party, where, instead of harmony, there are jealousies, indifference and lack of leadership. The Liberal party is in a state of confusion, and the session of 1897 has been a complete failure.

they are powerless. The paralysis of the official Liberal party may account in part for the dullness of public opinion in general. The English people want leading, and though it may disapprove and even detest the methods of its government, it will always find it hard to make its inner mind articulate unless there is a personality to give expression to its feeling. What leading has there been of late throughout the session which has established a record in ministerial blunders and misdeeds? There has not been a month in which any earnest opponent of the ministry can have been content with the conduct of the opposition in the House of Commons. The government majority is strong, and may be as reckless as ever. The joint dictatorship of Lord Salisbury and Chamberlain will apparently go on undisturbed by parliament unless they are unwise enough to quarrel. Neither the privileges and traditions of parliament nor the good name of England and her record as an enemy of oppression and a friend of freedom signify anything until public opinion, which is latent, but not dead, can find expression again, and gather itself once more into that resistless force before which the strongest dictatorships go down. The language fairly represents the opinion of the rank and file of the Liberal party. But there is no immediate prospect of reorganization or other radical remedy which might restore English Liberalism to its proper place in national politics.

## ANOTHER POSSIBLE STRIKE.

The trouble in the engineering trades apparently now a whet nearer settlement. The employers declare they will not permit the union men to return to their shops unless they undertake to work amicably with the masters. The attitude of the postoffice telegraphers is becoming threatening. The answer of the postmaster-general, the Duke of Norfolk, to their demands is not forthcoming, and if the telegraph operators carry out their threats an almost complete stoppage of the service is probable during the coming week. The delays in the transmission of messages are already becoming a serious matter.

## PETER'S PENCE DECLINING.

The Vatican, including the pope himself, is actively engaged in a campaign to stimulate the revenue of Peter's pence, which shows a serious decrease. The chief contributor to this fund has always been France; but the tendency of the Vatican to support republicanism has cooled the ardor of the aristocratic donors, and while the gifts from America have increased, the latter do not cover the French deficiency. The receipts are steadily abating, while the expenses of the Vatican are increasing.

## MORE DIAMOND FIELDS.

The news comes from South Africa of the discovery of important new diamond fields in Griqualand West. In the same district as the Kimberley mines, though the first discovery was made at the end of last year, it was not till May last that the governor of Cape Colony proclaimed it a payable diamond field in accordance with the Cape laws. Over 3,000 persons from Kimberley and Barkley rushed to the field and pegged out a large number of claims. These have been tested, and the results, as reported in recent letters and cablegrams, seem to put it beyond doubt that the find is a most valuable one, and fully equal to the famous Wessels mine at Kimberley.
