BEST COW FOR THE MILK DAIRYMAN.

Opinion of a Man Who Makes the Milk Business Pay.

"The milk business pays as very well. We ship to Philadelphia, the Farmers' Creamery company handling our milk. That company is doing good work, and I think will sooner or later drive out all the middlemen."

"What cows do you keep?" "Holsteins and Jerseys—mostly thoroughbreds, and some grades. We keep 50 cows in milk all the time."

"Which is the better of the two breeds?"

"It is hard to say. The Holsteins will give more milk of course they eat more, too, but I think the Holsteins will give a little more milk for an equal amount of food. Quality? There are some Holsteins that give milk as rich as any Jerseys, but others give much poorer milk, and the average is on the whole not so rich as Jersey milk. The color of Holstein milk is too light, and our chief reason for keeping Jerseys is to give our milk a higher color."

"How do you plan to color all the milk properly?"

"We put two milkers on Holsteins to one on Jerseys, and all pour their milk together into the tank that supplies the cooler. Our milk is aerated and cooled as soon as drawn from the cow, and when in this way it is strained directly into the tank all together it is well mixed and colored."

"Have you tried Guernseys?"

"We are just beginning with them. I have bought a good bull and am now after some good cows. A cross of Guernsey bull and Holstein cows ought to give about the right milkman's cow, with a large flow of well colored milk."

"What do you feed?"

"I do not raise anything but clover for hay, with corn, oats and wheat for grain. Wheat is sold. We grind equal parts of ear corn and oats for cow feed and add a little husked meal. Cottonseed meal has not paid us."—Interview in Rural New Yorker.

Good Butter in Warm Weather.

The question often arises how cream should be handled during warm weather to get the best results with the butter. It must be remembered that correct flavor scores 50 points, and here is where the most important work is done. Every day's cream must be made a special study. The observant butter maker will notice three very marked stages in the ripening of cream—viz, a flat acid, a sharp acid and a sour acid. The first acid has a flat, insipid taste, with very little odor. At this stage the cream should be thoroughly stirred, getting the air through it as much as possible. With the gradual thickening of the cream there approaches the borderland of the second stage of acid.

Now the skill of the butter maker is put to the test. He must so develop the acid and regulate the temperature that his ideal churning point is reached and have the cream in the churn and under motion within 15 minutes after he enters the creamery in the morning. No exact rule can be laid down for every man to work by. The danger now lies in overripening, not in too little. What is wanted is a rich, heavy, smooth cream, but not to the third stage where it has a disagreeable taste, forming in small chunks and showing whey around the sides.

The market reports say a great deal of butter lacks body and shows hot water. Remember that the body of butter is in the hands of the butter maker. Cool cream, cool churns, cold water, well cooled worker and tubs, haste in washing and handling, exposing the butter to the warm air as little as possible, then a cold cooler. The dairyman who has plenty of ice and water and a good room in which to keep the milk and who knows how to use the ice properly is the man who is going to succeed in furnishing the best butter to the market. By careful study any dairyman can acquire this knowledge, and then the exercise of it does the business.—Exchange.

Dairy and Creamery.

Cows and heifers naturally and normally come in heat every third week. If a cow has the best temperament instead of the milk temperament, the more you feed her the fatter she will get and often actually shrink in milk as she lays on beef.

Whatever else you skip on your trip to the World's fair do not omit to visit the beautiful barns of the Guernsey and Jersey cows. They are finer quarters than some cow milkers have for themselves. During the cold weather the barns were heated by stoves. The walls are built of tightly sealed boards, and the buildings are lighted by electricity. Nothing is too rich for the Jersey and Guernsey blood.

Let the trade in bottled cream increase. In summer when butter is down and ice cream is in demand a profitable use for the surplus cream can be found here. Bottled cream is healthful and delicious. Creamery men should find out how to sterilize it; then it will be a grand go. Figs and chickens will use up all the skim milk.

The oleomargarine monster is still rearing his greasy head in various parts of the Union. He eludes over newspaper correspondents at Washington and entices them into publishing news articles that puff the hog butter, telling all his readers how cheap it is, how wholesome and how much better than average butter. This trick was played during the past winter.

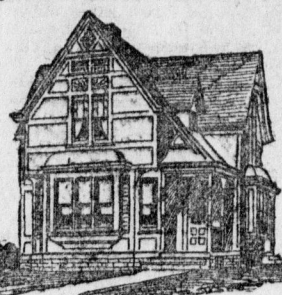

CONVENIENT COTTAGE HOME.

A Well Arranged and Attractive Dwelling That Costs but \$3,000. (Copyright, 1888, by American Press Association.)

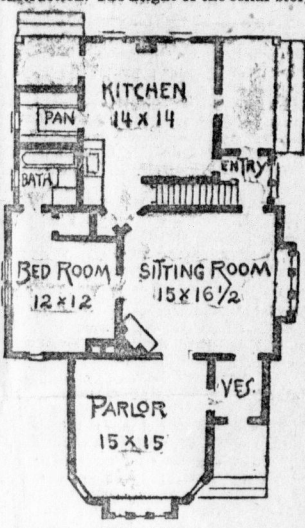
The plan here offered is that of a well arranged and neatly designed frame house in an attractive style of architecture. The style of the house depends much upon the location and the nature of the surrounding landscape. The first necessity in making a house beautiful is stability. To have the true meaning of the word home—rest, quiet and simplicity—the house should be so designed. The house need not be bare and simple in every part. Certain parts both inside and out can be more elaborately treated, but it must seem natural and not appear as "tacked on" ornament.



PERSPECTIVE VIEW.

This house has four main rooms on the first floor and three on the second, with a large hall, bathroom, pantry and numerous closets. The convenience of the interior is apparent on examination of the floor plans. The entrance is from the front through a small vestibule connected with the parlor and sitting room. These two latter rooms are connected by sliding doors 5 feet wide. Each of these rooms has a projecting bracket window, with three drawers under the stools. The bedroom is of fair size, from which opens a bathroom fully equipped with tub, bowl and closet. The kitchen is of good size, intended also for use as a dining room except on special occasions. The pantry, opening off the kitchen, is well fitted with shelves, pastry table and bins. A sink is located in the kitchen where shown, provided with drain board and inclosed under for pot closet. The stairway to the cellar leads down from the kitchen.

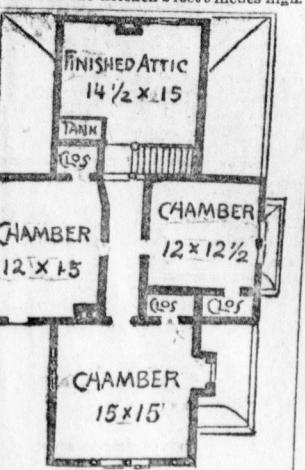
Going up the main stairs from a lobby between the kitchen and sitting room, we land in a small hall, from which are easily accessible the four chambers on this floor. Each chamber is provided with closet room. We give the following specifications of the construction: The height of the cellar story

is 7 feet, of the first story 9 1/2 feet, of the second story 8 1/2 feet. The foundations are of good rubblestone 18 inches thick, all exposed surfaces neatly pointed in the joints and the whole made level. The chimneys are of hard brick and mortar; all flues are separate and continuous from each floor; the tops are laid in cement mortar. The side walls and ceilings of the two full stories are hard finished on two coats of best brown mortar and seasoned lath. The frame of the house is of seasoned pine timbers of the following sizes: Sills, 6 by 8; standing plates and rafters, 3 by 4; joists, 2 by 8 and 2 by 10. All joists, standing plates and rafters are placed 16 inches apart from centers. All windows have seven-eighths stile and attic sash are hung on butts or pivots; all others to balance weights with best cord.

The exterior sides of the frame are covered with 1/2 by 8 inch lap siding on shiplap sheathing. The porches have level ceilings of yellow pine. The roofs are covered with cypress shingles on pine sheathing. The outside doors are of 1 1/2 by 4 inches tongued and grooved white pine close laid in paint. The inside doors are of 1 by 5 pine. All the inside casings on the first floor are of yellow pine finished natural with head and base blocks, all extending to the floor, with panels under each window. A chair board is put around the kitchen 2 feet 9 inches high.



SECOND STORY.

The bathroom and kitchen are wainscoted with yellow pine. The closets are all shelved and hooked in the usual manner. The sliding doors are 5-paneled, all others 4-paneled and molded, of seasoned white pine double faced 1 1/2 inches thick for outside and rooms and 1 1/4 for closets. The front door has four bottom panels, with reeded rail and tinted glass in upper part. The house was completed just at Carthage, Ill., for \$2,000, including a furnace in the cellar.

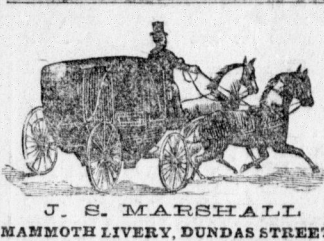
