Crops and Locomotive Fuel.

The adoption of fuel oil on the locomotives employed on the railroads traversing the interior valleys of California has removed one of the chief sources of danger from fire to the ripening grain fields. Locomotives using it do not emit any sparks or effect red-hot cinders to ignite the withered grass along the right of way or the parched grain in the neighboring fields. Henceforth grain crops are protected from the danger of fire. The prospect of the wheat-growing valleys; the railroad claim agent's occupation will practically disappear, a big leak in the corporation's treasury will be stopped and the farmer's fire insurance rates will drop to correspond with the diminished risk the use of fuel oil on locomotives has caused.

NEW LABOR BODY BEING FORMED

To Combine in One Organization All Toronto Unions

INSTEAD OF TRADES COUNCIL

Erico Coal Company Offers Its Employees 10 Per Cent Increase—The C. N. R. Strike.

Toronto, July 5.—The adoption of a constitution for the proposed new labor body, the Toronto District Labor Council, which is to take the place of the Trades and Labor Council, and centralize in one organization all the different labor associations in Toronto, was considered again last night at a special meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, and the main article of the constitution has now been agreed upon. Some minor rules of order, however, are yet to be decided upon, and these will be discussed at another meeting to be held on the second Thursday in July.

TEN PER CENT ADVANCE.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 5.—Ten per cent to all its workers was the advance given by the Erico Coal Company yesterday, and this plan, it is understood, will be followed by all other companies there having an agreement to this effect. The increase, officially termed a "bonus," is a reward to men faithful to the company, and an incentive to strikers to apply for work.

PEACEFUL VICTORY.

New York, July 5.—Organized ironmongers here announce that they have gained a peaceful victory, 2,000 of their number having been granted the nine-hour day through arbitration proceedings between representatives of the union and of the National Foundrymen's Association.

THE C. N. R. STRIKE.

Winipeg, July 4.—There is nothing new in the C. N. R. strike situation. Supt. Hanna says the company is in a position to treat the situation as if no strike was on, but the men claim there is nothing doing, and that they are stronger than the main lines to the boundary are running as usual, but others are late and apparently difficulty is experienced in moving freight.

THEIR FINAL EFFORT.

Toronto, July 5.—The local plumbers are in hopes of having their difficulty with the employers settled within the next few days. At a meeting of the union last night it was announced that the Master Plumbers' Association had appointed a special committee to meet with the grievance committee of the union tonight, with a view to reaching an amicable settlement. The employers' committee have been given full power to act, providing the terms are satisfactory to both sides.

The Sheet Metal Workers' Union at their meeting last night accepted the decision of the committee that waited upon the employers and arranged a satisfactory division of the working hours.

The Garment Pressers' Union held a successful organization meeting last night, which was largely attended. Another meeting will be held next week.

THE COAL STRIKE.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., July 5.—The movement of empty coal cars along the railroads and the unusual activity about several of the collieries in the region indicate that an end to the strike made in a few days to start work at some of the collieries. The operators assert that they have sufficient men engaged to run the railroads, and that strikers and imported men, to man several of the mines.

In the Hazleton region, the Padesco colliery, which has been closed since the strike, is expected to resume work. A number of strikers are said to have applied to their companies for work.

The Wyoming region all indications point to a resumption of work at the Nanticoke No. 5 colliery of the Susquehanna Coal Company.

The Fisheries Department, which fixes the close season, has the matter under consideration.

C.P.R. CAR SHOPS AT PERTH BURNED

Valuable Machinery and Several Cars Destroyed.

SOME 300 MEN OUT OF WORK

Night Watchman Missing and May Have Perished—Rebuilding to Start at Once.

Perth, Ont., July 5.—The blacksmith shop, machine shop, oil house, main office and four box cars, together with a large amount of valuable machinery in the C. P. R. car shops in Perth, were totally destroyed by fire between 4 and 6 o'clock this morning.

THE START.

The fire was first seen in the blacksmith shop, and is supposed to have started from one of the various furnaces in use.

Alarms were immediately sounded and responded to by firemen and volunteer citizens. The buildings will be rebuilt at once.

WOOD MILL SAVED.

About ten lines of hose were attached, but the fire had gained great headway, and it was with much difficulty that the adjoining wood mill in which the cars were built was saved.

The wood mill was in flames several times, but the firemen worked hard, and finally had the fire under control.

BAD FOR THE MEN.

Three hundred men are thrown out of work. Night Watchman Roland Burr is missing. He was seen entering the blacksmith shop while the fire was raging.
