SWEPT OVER THE FALLS

Workmen at Niagara Meets a Terrible Death.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Oct. 6. — The first man to lose his life in the rapids above the falls, where the contractors are preparing to sink the deep wheels for the mammoth turbines of the Niagara Electrical Development Company, was drowned yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock. Edward J. Smith, a workman, was out at the extreme end of the cribwork and in getting out of the way of the crane of a derrick that was being swung, stepped backward, losing his balance, fell headlong into the seething water and was swept over the falls. He was about 25 years of age and leaves a wife and one child.

THE SOO BYE-ELECTION

That and Muskoka To Be Held On Oct. 27.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 6.—The provincial bye-elections in Sault Ste. Marie and Muskoka will be held on the 27th of October. The vacancy in Sault Ste. Marie was caused by the court's unseating Andrew Macmillan (Conservative). He is again a candidate, and is opposed by C. N. Smith, his former opponent. The Muskoka vacancy was caused by the death of Dr. Bridgland (Liberal), who defeated P. A. Mahaffy by 80. Mr. Mahaffy is again the Conservative candidate and is opposed by Dr. Hart, of Brucebridge.

THE SOO RIOTERS

They Plead Guilty to Charge of Common Assault.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Oct. 5. — The trial of eleven men arrested in connection with the disturbances of Monday last began at 11 o'clock today before Magistrate Quibell. Each man of the eleven has two distinct charges made against him, of being riotously and tumultuously assembled together to the disturbance of the public peace, doing damage to the property of the Lake Superior Power Company and aggravated assault on peace officers. Andrew Deans is also charged with shooting at Fireman Fringle with intent. Jos. Nault and A. Grenier, the two men wounded by being shot by the police on Monday, were this morning removed from the hospital to the jail, but are yet unable to stand their trial, which will have to be postponed. Leonard Lavigne, Baptiste Rojon, Albert Lalonde, Frank Landon, Ed Glasson and Fred Winer were first called, and charged with aggravated assault. They were willing to plead guilty to a charge of common assault, to which the crown attorney assented, saying he thought the ends of justice would be thus met. Magistrate Quibell accepted the plea, but deferred sentence. The payment of men at the general office continues, and will likely not be finished before Thursday.

DR. BRETHOUR DEAD

A Pioneer Methodist Minister Has Passed Away.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 6. — Rev. Dr. L. Brethour, Ph.D., one of the pioneers of Methodism in Ontario, died last evening at Niagara Falls, Ont., on Saturday. He entered the Wesleyan Conference in 1869, and was ordained in 1864. He had during a life of hard and earnest work been stationed at Napanee, Belleville, Windsor, Brantford, Hamilton, Niagara Falls and a number of other prominent places. He was president of the Hamilton Conference in 1887, and was six times a representative to the General Conference. Dr. Brethour was honored with the degree of Ph.D. in 1891, was prominent in temperance work, and moral reforms.

PREMIER BALFOUR MAKES CHANGES IN THE CABINET

fiscal tradition, to alter fundamentally the fiscal tradition that has prevailed during the last two generations, had hoped to have found in your speech a definite statement of adherence to the principles of free trade as the ordinary basis of our fiscal and commercial system, and an equally definite repudiation of the principle of protection in the interest of our national industries. But in their absence, I cannot help thinking that such declarations as those which have quoted cannot fail to have the effect of materially encouraging the advocates of direct protection and of discouraging those who, like me, and I hoped yourself, believe that our present system of free imports and especially of food imports, is on the whole most advantageous to the country. I think we do not contend that the principles on which it rests possess any such authority or sanctity as to forbid any departure from it. You have in your second speech said that this subject could no longer be left an open question among the members of the Government, and I think I have had enough to prove to you that there is no such agreement between us on the general question as to make it possible for me to be a satisfactory exponent of your views or of those of the Government in the debates which must inevitably take place in the next session of Parliament. I cannot adequately express the deep regret which I feel in separating myself from a government with which I believe myself to be in sympathy on all important questions of policy, or the anxiety with which I anticipate the wide division which I fear must result from the unexpected scope and strenuousness of the debates in the ranks of the Unionist party."

A GENERAL ELECTION.

Christ Church Congregation Welcome Rev. R. S. W. Howard.

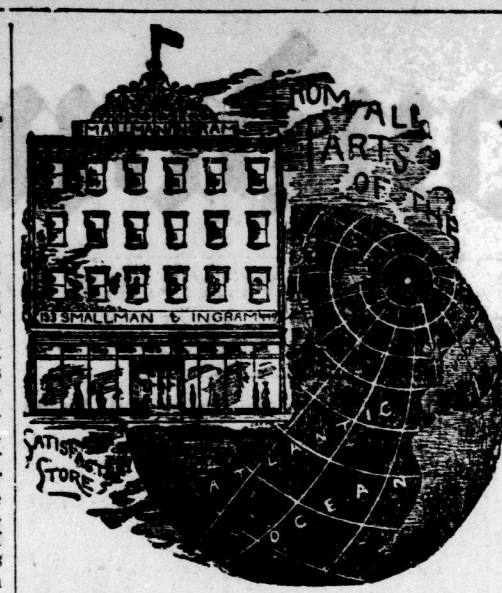

His picture galleries at Chatsworth, Hardwick and Devonshire have a world wide fame. The Duke's recreations are shooting and racing, in the latter of which he has been very successful. He is a prominent member of the Athenaeum, Oxford and Cambridge, Devonshire and Brooks Clubs, and when in London from 1866 to 1877, he was a country residence at Chatsworth House and Hardwick Hall, Derbyshire; Holker Hall, Milnthorpe, Westmorland; Bolton Abbey, Yorkshire; Compton Place, Eastbourne; Lismore Castle, Waterford.

AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN, ESQ.

J. Austen Chamberlain, civil lord of the admiralty, M. P. for East Worcestershire, was born in 1863, and is the eldest son of the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain. He was educated at Rugby, Trinity College, and Cambridge. He is a member of Brooks' and Devonshire Clubs, and his address is at Prince's Garden, S. W. Highgate, Moor Green, Birmingham.

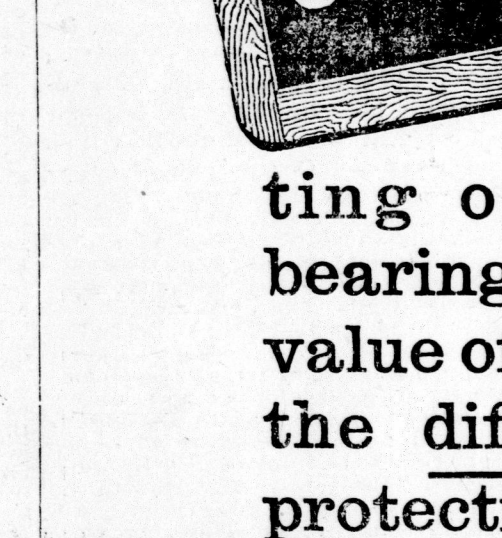
