THE SLAUGHTER OF ELEPHANTS

French Explorer Wantonly Killed Six in Four Minutes.

Viscount Du Bour De Bozas Tells of His Hunting Adventures in Wilds of Abyssinia.

Killing six elephants in four minutes is the "record" of elephant slaughter just established by the Vis-count du Bour de Bozas, in Abyssinia, as against the record established by Superintendent of Keddars Sanderson, working in the Garrow Hills of India, when he captured 136 of the great creatures in one drive. But between the wanton killing of six such creatures and the capture of 136 for military and other purposes, there is a wide gap toward humanity, which the gap toward humanity, which Frenchman probably has not consid-

Finding six elephants at a water hole to which they had been obliged to come for drink, the Frenchman, waited upon by coolies carrying his express guns loaded to his hand, fired at an average range of 25 feet, knocking over the great brutes with more than the ease that the man with a target rifle shoots rabbits.

And yet, trained to domesticity, any one of these animals might have been given charge of a babe, keeping flies off it, keeping it in bounds of its outof-door nursery, gentle with it as ever was the child's mother. And one of them could have been set to piling teak, working as men would not have worked; careful always, considerate of the right of way of vehicles and of passers-by—royal to his master and his master's wish.

SIX IN FOUR MINUTES. And six of these in four minutes! It might be sport in Abyssinia; it is akin to murder as the news of it comes to America. The viscount had an appointment from France to make ex-plorations in Abyssinia, and King Menelek had given full passports to the party. But from the French point of view there was no necessity for elephant shooting; certainly not for six of the animals in four minutes. But

He followed later, with raions, noise equipments, and the tools for constructing the mighty "keddar" into which the big beasts, then ravaging the rice fields of the settled section, were to be driven. In the woods a second examination of men caused

the turning back of the inefficients, and with a small regiment of picked men he pushed on to the Garrow Hills.

The keddar, as constructed, was a giant corral, built of tree trunks, braced and entertwined with saphings, having a drop gate suspended by a having a drop gate suspended by a rope which one blow of an axe would sever. From this gate wide wings, built of heavy trees spread outward, the jungle inside of them left un-marked by any sign of man. Beyond the ends of these wing walls, however, trees in line with them for many yards were hacked and the jungle brush broken and trampled. This for the reason that a herd of elephants fear such signs almost as much as

they fear man himself. Inside this wide angle of heavy walls converging to the corral gate cross lines of dry grass were stretched and covered with the natural green of the jungle, the purpose being that when the herded creatures should pass these succesive lines of timber they should be fired from behind stampeding the animals into the corral, which had been made further proof against a charge by a circular ditch running all around the inside. THEIR SAGACITY THEIR UNDOING

The herd being found, the hunters left to the sagacity of the beasts their own capture. For, with outposts here and there, just enough alarm was inspired in the creatures to keep them moving, and just enough of "signs" were left in the jungle to keep them headed for the keddahs. Not until the herd were within the solid walls of the wings was the first row of grass fired. Then natives, shooting muskets, beating drums and clappers and hooting and shouting, closed in be-

One hundred and thirty-six of the great brutes had stamped past the hidden gatekeeper, when a blow of his axe dropped the last section of the great barrier. One female had escaped charging the line of fire behind, and she had her revenge two miles back. when, coming upon a native who had been engaged in the hunt, she killed him and trod his body into shapeless-

Viscount de Bozas' six elephants killed in four minutes, are food for the vultures and carrion-eating animals of the jungle. Some of those entrapped by Sanderson have done noble duty in British campaigns in Asia, establishing for their kind the title of king of beasts.



PARLIAMENT CLOSES TODAY

A Grant of \$50,000 for Earthquake Victims Passed.

Several Government Bills Bropped-Mr. Sutherland's Plans for St. Lawrence Mavigation.

Ottawa, May 14.-Rapid progress was made in the House of Commons today. Prorogation of parliament is fixed for tomorrow afternoon, at 3 o'clock. Several measures, which the government had not intended pressing this session, but were simply introto the house, were held over until next session.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier informed the house that he desired to take advantanswer to the numerous applications which have been made for assistance to railway construction. The government, he said, had determined not to ask parliament this session for an appropriation for that object.

In committee on ways and means, Hon. Mr. Fielding's resolution extending the period of the time for the free admission of machinery used in the manufacture of beet root sugar for one year until April 1, 1903, was adopted.

INTERCOLONIAL EXTENSION. This afternoon Mr. Charles Marcil, M. P. (Bonaventure), in view of the action of the senate in rejecting the Gaspe and Western Railway bill, asked the government during the recess to consider the advisability of extending the Intercolonial to Paspebiac, on the Bay des Chaleur, utilizing the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway. Thus an open ocean port would be available practically all the year.

Mr. Lemieux (Gaspe) questioned the feasibility of navigation of the Bay des Chaleur throughout the winter. Lemieux desired to see a better winter steamship service to his constituency. Sir Richard Cartwright called attention to the difference of view as to winter navigation. He thought that the government might be able to arrange an improvised steamship service to Gaspe.

ST. LAWRENCE NAVIGATION. At 4:40 the house went into supply on the few remaining items of the supplementary estimates. Upon the item of \$280,000 for improvements in the aids to navigation on the St. Lawrence, Hon. Mr.Sutherland said that the rates of insurance upon ships on that route were from two to five times as much as from competing United States ports. This proved a severe handicap to the producers of Canada, and the representatives of the shipping interests, as well as of the marine insurance companies, had represented that a material reduction could be obtained by improving the aids to navigation.
