

Pittsburg Beat By New York--Mullin Lost To Athletics

YOUNGS BEAT THE RAMBLERS TOOK POSTPONED GAME 7 TO 3

The Ramblers Had Ten Errors and Did Poor Fielding.

THE MATCH WAS A SWATFEST

The Bases Were Filled a Couple of Times and a Run Was Forced.

The game at Tecumseh Park yesterday between Youngs and the Ramblers was won by Youngs by a score of 7 to 3, and was worthy of being witnessed by a far larger crowd than was present. Youngs, particularly, played good ball all the way through, and had Brooks for the Ramblers been given anything like the support he deserved, the contest would have been an exceedingly keen one. A glance at the error column of the Ramblers tells its own story.

The Scoring.
In the first inning Gatecliff hit a long fly to left field and stole second. Jackson sacrificed and Gatecliff went to third. Ward flew out to left and McFie struck out, leaving Gatecliff on third.

The Ramblers scored one in the first when Brennan hit safely, stole second and scored on a long hit to centre by Wanless.

The Ramblers scored again in the second on a hit by Pook and a long drive to left for three bases by Brooks.

A Wild Throw.
Youngs scored their first run on a wild throw by Sharratt, who sent the ball about ten feet over Wanless' head and when it got lost in the grass Gatecliff got all around the bases.

In the fourth Ward got first on a hot liner, went to second on a bunt by McFie, who got to first when Sharratt fumbled. Brooks then gave Clark a base on balls. Ward scored on a sacrifice by Phillips. Kerr was hit by Brooks, and with three on bases Pook made a splendid running catch of a high foul and retired the side.

The Fifth Inning.
In the fifth Brooks passed Jackson who went to second when Ward bunted safely. Jackson stole third and Ward went to second when Sharratt threw wild to Pitzmaurice. Both Ward and Jackson scored on a hot liner over third by McFie. Stroud did some fumbling and made a poor throw and a moment later McFie scored on a hit by Clark.

Kerr singled to second on a sacrifice by Munroe and scored when Brennan dropped a fly in right field.

Clark Was Slugging.
In the seventh Isky Clark hit a long one to left for two bases. Phillips got first when Wanless dropped an easy fly. Both men advanced when Smith fumbled an easy grounder by Eccleston. Clark was forced in when Brooks gave Gatecliff a base on balls.

With three on bases and two out, Jackson hit an easy one to short and retired the side.

Jackson's Great Catch.
In the next inning Jackson made a sensational one-hand catch of a hot liner over second, hit by Stroud.

In the eighth Brooks singled and went to second when Sharratt fumbled. Smith drove a hot liner over third, advancing both men. Brennan flew out, Wanless fanned and Pitzmaurice flew out, leaving three on bases.

In the ninth Stroud hit to third safely and Quick hit a fast one over second. Stroud hit a home run, scored when Ward dropped the ball which was thrown to him. Quick stole third, Pook struck out, Brooks was caught on a foul and Sharratt was thrown out at first.

DR. J. A. HUGHSON INJURED AT RACES

Was Going With the Arrow When Throw Against Fence.

LEFT LEG WAS BROKEN

Removed to His Home in Lambeth in City Ambulance.

Dr. J. A. Hughson was thrown out when his cart collided with the fence at the Queen's Park track yesterday. His left leg being broken, and his head cut and bruised. The doctor was picked up in his legs with a running mate, and was attempting to break the track record of 1:05, which the pacer set a week ago.

The Arrow was put on with The Broncho, owned by Dr. Woods, and mounted by Del Woods, when the accident happened, as they were turning off the back stretch, having gone the first quarter in 31 seconds.

Arrow Ran Three Miles.
The Arrow ran about three miles around the track before being captured by Del Woods. The lines had become entangled in his legs and lashed him on at a furious clip.

The ambulance was called, and the injured driver was attended by a first-aid man and taken to his home in Lambeth.
