DUNCAN M'COLL DEAD
Was One of Best-Known Residents of Aldboro Township.
West Lorne, Nov. 18.—Duncan C. McColl, one of the best-known residents of the township of Aldboro, died on Tuesday evening at his residence here at the age of 74 years. He had resided in the township for many years, and was very prominent in its municipal and political life. Mr. McColl was very widely known and highly respected. Deceased is survived by a grown-up family. Remains will be interred in Evergreen Cemetery, but the arrangements have not yet been made.
After a four-weeks' illness from meningitis, Morley A., eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Ripley, died Tuesday, in his 5th year. Deceased is survived by his parents and one sister and a brother. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2 o'clock to Evergreen Cemetery.

DIAMOND WEDDING
GRAND OLD COUPLE
Mr. and Mrs. Skinner Wedded in London Just Sixty Years Ago.
ARE 81 YEARS OF AGE
Celebration Will Be Held at Family Home on York Street on Saturday Night—Well Spent Lives.

Just sixty years ago tomorrow ex-Ald. William Skinner and his wife were married. It is given to few couples to spend sixty years of happy married life together, and naturally the occasion is one of general rejoicing, for Mr. and Mrs. Skinner and the members of their family, who will attend a celebration to be held on Saturday evening.
Only the immediate relatives will be present, but notwithstanding this, Mr. and Mrs. Skinner are the recipients of very many congratulations from their very wide circle of friends throughout the city.

Youthful Sweethearts.
Mr. and Mrs. Skinner, who are both 81 years of age, have been sweethearts ever since they were little boys and little girls, going to school together in the pretty Devonshire village of Crediton. Mrs. Skinner was Miss Emma Saunders, daughter of the late James Saunders, and came with her father to Canada in 1849.
Mr. Skinner when a young man decided to make his home in Canada, and came out in the same boat with his future wife.
The party landed in London on May 24, 1849, and have been residents of London ever since. Mr. James Saunders took up his abode in what was then known as the Grand Tower, our present site of Cowan's hardware store.

Married in 1849.
The marriage of Mr. Skinner to Miss Saunders took place on Nov. 20, 1849, at the home of Mr. Saunders. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Dr. Crofts, of the New Connexion Methodist Church.
Few men have played a more important part in the development of London than Mr. Skinner. In 1876 he was elected alderman to represent the third ward. He served continually for 23 years and was never defeated at the polls. For many years he served on the school board, and is at present, and has been for some time, a member of the board of health.

Founded Eureka Lodge.
Mr. Skinner has been an Oddfellow for 56 years, and had the honor of founding Eureka Lodge.
On the occasion when he completed his 50th year as an Oddfellow the members of the order presented him with a handsome jewel, which he still has. For 42 years Mr. Skinner has been a Mason, and for the last 34 years has been treasurer of St. George's Lodge, No. 42. He is also a prominent member of St. George's Society and is at the present time chairman of the relief committee.

Skinner, of the postoffice, and Ernest Skinner, of the Grand Tower, our department, sons; Mrs. Noble, of this city, and Miss Willa Skinner, both whom live with their parents, and Mr. and Mrs. W. H.
