## THE ASHTABULA AT LAST FREED

The Big C. P. R. Ferry Floated Yesterday and Found But Little Damaged.

## STRANDED TWELVE DAYS

Her Cargo Landed and Boat Will Be Taken to Cleveland for Repairs.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Port Burwell, Dec. 24.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon the coal steamer Ash-tubula was floated and was brought into the harbor here, after being grounded for 12 days. An examination has been made of the vessel, and she is in much better condition than was anticipated. She will proceed to-day to Cleveland under her own steam, to go into dry dock for overhauling.

It will be remembered that the Ash-tubula went aground on Dec. 12, after a terrific blow. She was attempting to make the harbor, but the sea dashed her onto a sand bar. For several days the waves beat her fiercely, and at times the ship and her crew of thirty
