LONDON MAN DIES IN KENTUCKY

Famous Sire Brought to Canada With Newcourt by Late Ex-Mayor T. D. Hodgens, of This City, Finishes Career-Offer of \$30,000 Was Refused by the Owners.

The stallion Albert, imported to Canada with Newcourt more than twenty years ago by the late T. D. Hodgens, of London, Ont., died this week in Kentucky. He was 28 years old, and one of the most notable sires in America. When Is years old he was purchased for the Adelbert stud, at Hopkinsville, Ky.. by its owners, Dr. M. W. Williams and Major Cyrus S. Radford, assistant quarters with United States were the United States. termaster of the United States marines.

Albert distinguished himself as a sire in an incredibly short time after being established at Adelbert stud, and in 1909 Williams and Radford refused an offer of \$39,000 for him. Their judgment was well vindicated by the next crop of yearlings, which brought \$32,000, one of the number selling for \$7,700. Purchased in the fall of 1896, his first crop, nine or ten 2-year-olds, placed him a premier stallion in 1899, with \$95,975 to his credit. In this crop came Mesmerist, the champion two-year-old of his time, and winner of \$50,000 in stakes and purses. SIRED SOME BIG WINNERS.

Then followed Herbert, winner of \$45,000; Bonnibert, winner of \$40,000 and holder of the American record for one and one-eighth miles at Brighton Beach, New York, for a number of years, and Hatasoo, winner of \$20,000, a record holder at Sheepshead Bay. The list of his winners is extensive, and his percentage is estimated by no less an authority than General Jackson at .95, probably higher than that of any horse in America.

During the ten years from 1897 to 1907 he had an average of about twelve yearlings shipped to New York each season, and these sold for \$150,000. Their combined winnings have been nearly half a million dollars. Albert belonged to the No. 4 family, and was a noted race horse in Englund. He captured the Seaton Deleval Stakes and other important races. His sire, Albert Victor, was a superior race horse and brother to George Frederick, winner of the English Derby.

Albert's dam. Hawthorne Bloom, was a great mare, being out of Alice Hawthorne, dam of Thornmanby, winner of the Derby and other celebrated races, J. H. Walsh-"Stonehenge"—the distinguished English authority on breeding, made a table of the best English matrons, and eight of the first ten appear in Albert's tabulation.—Toronto Globe.


