Spencer's Murders Likely Delusions

Police Think His Mind Is Affected by Too Much Opium.

Chicago, Oct. 7.—A speedy trial for the murder of Mrs. Mildred Allison Rexroat on Sept. 25 was today promised Henry Spencer, whose confession of 20 murders, woven by an opium-clouded imagination, has been the subject of a sensational story in the papers. The authorities will continue to investigate his fantastic stories in the hope of establishing further facts.

His admission of the Rexroat crime is substantiated by evidence. He is known to have committed many of the large number of burglaries he has confessed, and there is a possibility that he may have slain Mrs. Annabel Wright last summer. She was beaten to death with a hammer by a man who had rented a room and robbed her.

The remainder of Spencer's twenty murders are believed to be the dreams of a man obsessed by that form of insanity known as "delirium tremens," a delusion described as penitential insanity.

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NEW TARIFF HELPS FARMER BUT HITS CITY MAN HARD

Big Jump in Meat, Milk, Butter and Cream Prices as Result of Heavy Shipments to the States—Lumber Mills and Many Factories Will Be Helped.

Sarnia, Oct. 7.—President Wilson has signed the tariff reduction bill, and nowhere has more intense interest been created than along the border between Canada and the States. It is in the towns and cities along the line between the two countries that the effect of the reduction will be most vitally noticed and felt.

Sarnia is a border town, and it is a shipping port of considerable magnitude. Therefore, the latest move in Mr. Wilson's career has caused what might literally be called a furor among merchants and businessmen here.

The effect of the reduction on merchant, manufacturer, and employee, and upon the agriculturalist locally, will differ only in degree among the other towns and cities similarly situated.

Helps Lumbermen.
