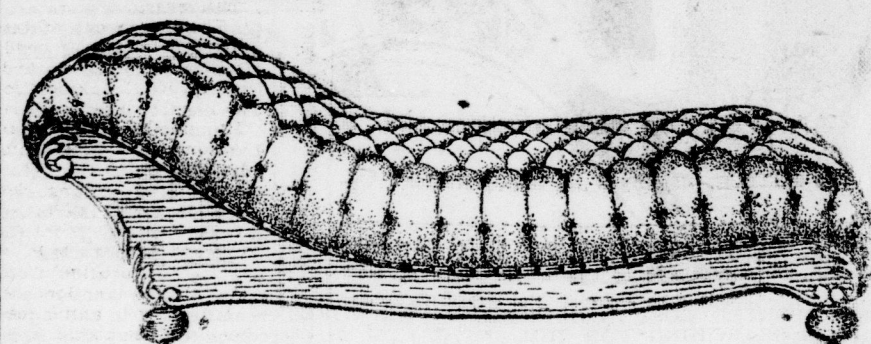

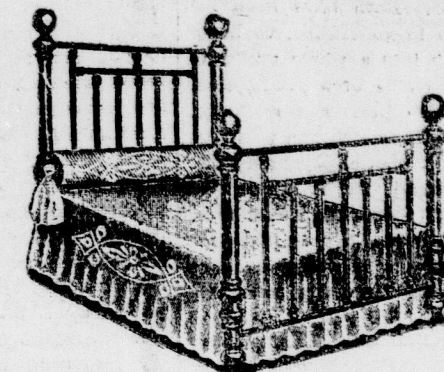

SCHOOLBOYS CALLED TO GERMAN COLORS

Twelve Thousand in Berlin and Many Elsewhere in Training.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 28.—A cable to the Tribune from Copenhagen says: "Twelve thousand schoolboys between the ages of 15 and 17 have been enrolled as volunteer recruits in Berlin. They have been divided into 20 companies, and their military training is proceeding with all possible speed. It is intended that they shall take the field early in the spring. Many will then be under 16. In the Province of Brandenburg, which includes Berlin, 60,000 schoolboys have been enrolled as volunteer recruits."

RUSSIAN GOVERNOR OF GALICIA DEAD

AMSTERDAM (via London), Nov. 27. A Vienna telegram to the Frankfurter Zeitung says that Count Bobrinsky, the Russian Governor-General of Galicia, died at Lemberg today of apoplexy.

GERMANS THREATEN TO USE SWITZERLAND

Take Alleged Flight by Allies as Excuse For Neutrality Breach.

[Canadian Press.] Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—12:45 a.m.—The Berliner Tageblatt, quoting an article referring to the allegations that British airmen violated Swiss neutrality in the recent raid on the Zeppelin factory at Friedrichshafen, says: "In case of a repetition of the violation of Swiss neutrality by France or England, it is not to be expected that Germany will respect Swiss neutrality on the Belfort frontier. The Swiss Federal Assembly has ordered that all aviators flying over Swiss territory be shot down without further orders."

RECRUIT MAY BE SPY

MONTREAL, Nov. 27.—"Private Anderson" of the Twenty-Third Battalion Westmount Rifles, under suspicion of being a German spy, was arrested today as a precautionary measure, and turned over to the provost marshal, Major Date. The major will have an investigation.

DESCRIBES VIGILS OF MEN IN TRENCHES

Officer Says Real War Is Not Composed of Dashing Charges.

[Canadian Press Correspondence.] LONDON, Nov. 18.—Something of the inner feelings and impressions of the men actually in the trenches at the front are contained in the following extracts from a letter sent to a friend in London by an officer with the British expeditionary force: "Sitting here and reading the English papers that arrive, one cannot help feeling that England, at any rate, has not yet succeeded in banishing the spectacular and romantic conception of war, which no longer bears any relation to the actuality. The papers still give the impression that war is an affair of dash and dash. Incidents are invented, like the charge of the Bengal cavalry. Other incidents, true in themselves, but isolated and not characteristic, such as the engagement of the London Scottish, are made to convey a picture of the whole battle."

Gruesome Vigils. "As a matter of fact, this is not what is happening. The bravery of our men, and they are splendidly brave, consists in sitting for ten days and nights in sodden trenches, with the terrifying noises and earth-shaking concussion of shells, which don't kill them, dropping on the earth around, and the horror of the shell which does kill them dropping occasionally right into the trench, with a man here and a man there being picked off as he inadvertently puts his head a couple of inches too high, or wriggles past a spot on which a German picked shot has had his rifle laid for hours. With the loss of one man one night, and another man another night, as the men crawl out to get their rations, or, as the ration party comes along the road after dark, to bring them from the refilling point; with, for their only activity and excitement, a crawl of four or five men on their bellies in the dark to examine an enemy's trench, which is thought to have been evacuated, and a very occasional use of bayonet, if it turns out not to have been evacuated, and is only lightly held, and to sit there hoping that our artillery, whose shells they can hear whistling overhead, is making the enemy as uncomfortable as they are making us."

Marksmen Wanted. "The false conception of what is going on creates a false picture of the soldiers that are wanted. I read of the sportsmen's battalion, all athletes and so forth; all very nice if individual prowess was in question, but it is not. What is wanted is ordinary men trained to discipline and trained to shoot. Plenty of them—men who can be held in not to shoot until the proper moment, not men who are going to whoop and yelp and kill two Germans at one stroke. PARIS HANDS BOUQUET TO MYRON T. HERRICK

PARIS, Nov. 28.—12:45 a.m.—Adrien Mithouard, president of the Paris City Council, has written a letter to Myron T. Herrick, the retiring American ambassador, expressing the city council's admiration for him, and its regret that he is leaving. "Our deep regret at your departure from our city, whose heart you have won," says the letter, "is mitigated by the thought that far from us in your country you will be able to help him still closer the bonds which unite our two peoples. Paris, which remembers the hopes, expresses to you in this grave period through which we are passing her unalterable attachment. She will ever retain feeling of the deepest gratitude to you."

PRISONERS CLEARED 700 ACRES OF LAND

TORONTO, Nov. 27.—That the establishment of the industrial farm at Fort William has not only lifted from the province much of the burden of maintaining prisoners sentenced in northern courts, but has produced in cleared land an asset of at least \$10,000, is shown by a review of the work of the year received by Hon. W. J. Hanna today. "The superintendent of the farm, R. E. Elliott, reports that there are nearly 700 acres of hand-chopped land and that next spring two hundred acres will be ready for crop. This land when cleared is worth \$100 an acre, since it lies close to the city. "A rough last spring the area ready for crop was not large, a large quantity of root crops and considerable field grain was produced. Since the farm was opened two years ago there have been 1,688 commitments."

WIRETAPPER ACCUSED OF STEALING NEWS

Arrested in Office of New York Paper—Caught By Fake Message.

[Canadian Press.] NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—H. L. Linder, a telegraph operator in the employ of the Postal Telegraph Company and stationed at the office of the New York Globe, was arrested today, charged with violating section 552 of the penal law, in that he revealed contents of a telegraphic message sent out by the Associated Press. "For a long time it has been evident that the dispatches of the Associated Press were being systematically stolen and were re-distributed by a number of smaller agencies to their clients. A careful watch was set upon the business and suspicion pointed to certain men employed in the office of the Globe, a New York evening paper, as the guilty persons. The case was considered by the executive committee of the Associated Press directors at a recent meeting and a plan to detect the culprits and bring them to justice was adopted."

Bulletins Copied. For the purpose of transmitting the more important news in bulletins, wires connect the central office of the organization at 51 Chambers street, with the editorial rooms of the various members in New York. In the office of the Globe these bulletins were copied surreptitiously by H. L. Linder, a telegraph operator employed by the Postal Telegraph Company, and repeated to the New York News Bureau, a Wall Street concern. Frequently within two or three minutes after their receipt in the office of the Globe they appeared on the new bureau's ticker and in the reports of various other news organizations.

Fake Dispatch Sent.

For the purpose of trapping the wire tapper, the following dispatch was prepared: "Bulletin (E. O. S.) Petrograd, Nov. 27.—The Russian dreadnought Tula, formerly the Irmak, striking a mine in the Gulf of Finland, is a complete loss with 450 lives."

—LOSS OF FLIES. "The Irmak was one of four Baltic dreadnoughts laid down at the Kronstadt yards in 1912. She had a displacement of 28,000 tons and carried 214-inch guns and twenty 6-inch guns."

Bulletin Sent Out. The short bulletin was arranged so that the message should go to the Globe alone. As anticipated the dispatch instantly appeared upon the ticker and not long after was printed in the papers served by other news agencies in different parts of the country. As soon as this was done and before it appeared in any issue of the Globe, a notice to "kill" was sent out and the telegram therefore at no time reached the public as from the Associated Press. Linder was arrested and made a full confession. He was arraigned this afternoon before Magistrate F. E. House and held in \$5,000 bail for a hearing on December 1.

GERMAN ASSURANCE "IMPUDENT MESSAGE"

Reported Interview of Sir Roger Casement Scored By Press.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Nov. 28.—3:30 a.m.—The London papers today print, for the first time, accounts concerning the reported visit to Berlin recently of Sir Roger Casement, a leader in the Irish National Volunteer movement. A news dispatch on Nov. 28 said that Sir Roger interviewed the German foreign office relative to Germany's attitude towards Ireland.

The Daily News characterizes the announcement by the German foreign office that Germany never will invade Ireland as "an impudent message of goodwill." Both the Daily News and the Daily Mail print a column account of Sir Roger's visit, as taken from the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, the Mail characterizing it as a "remarkable episode." The Daily News says that "tremendous interest is being taken in Ireland in Casement's reported visit."

THICK WITH MINES

So Officer on Olympic Describes Scene of Audacious Misdeeds.

[Canadian Press.] VANCOUVER, Nov. 27.—John Hubbard, a civil official, has received a letter from his brother, J. W. Hubbard, an officer on the Olympic, in which he refers to the loss of the battleship Audacious and the rescue of the crew. Mr. Hubbard, writing on November 19, says: "We were coming around the north of Ireland, when we got the Marconi 'S. O. S.' which turned out to be the battleship Audacious sinking. We got alongside of her, lowered our boats, and saved all hands, also a black cat which I have safe in Southampton. After we got all aboard we tried to take the Audacious in tow, but were unsuccessful on account of the heavy sea, and could do no more than stand by until 7:30 p.m. We then proceeded to Lough Swilly, put the boys ashore, then went to Belfast, and left the ship there to lay up for I do not know how long."

"I may say I don't know how we escaped being struck by a mine, as there were eight picked up the next morning around the same place where we were, and about thirty miles west of us the Manchester Commerce was sunk by a mine."

ITALY LOSES HER FORMER MINISTER

Marquis Venosta Dies in Rome—Distinguished as Diplomat.

[Canadian Press.] Rome, Nov. 28.—5:55 a.m.—The Marquis Visconti Venosta, former Italian minister of foreign affairs, died in Rome this morning. The marquis was born in Milan in 1829. He had a distinguished career in the Italian diplomatic service, and as late as 1912 he was active in diplomatic negotiations between Italy and Austria.

ARRESTS PROMISED IN BAFF MURDER

New York Police on Trail of Poultry Dealer's Slayers.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Nov. 28.—With 25 poultry dealers under suspicion of having conspired to bring about the death of Barnett Baft, who was shot and killed in a street here Tuesday night, arrests within 24 hours were promised by the police today. Baft, a dealer in poultry, had opposed the methods of a so-called poultry trust, and, according to his friends, had for some time been marked for assassination. A man under suspicion as being the go-between, who procured the murder, is being sought in Pennsylvania and New Jersey. Evidence is said to be in police possession pointing to a score of persons, whose names Harry Baft, son of Barnett Baft, has given the authorities.
