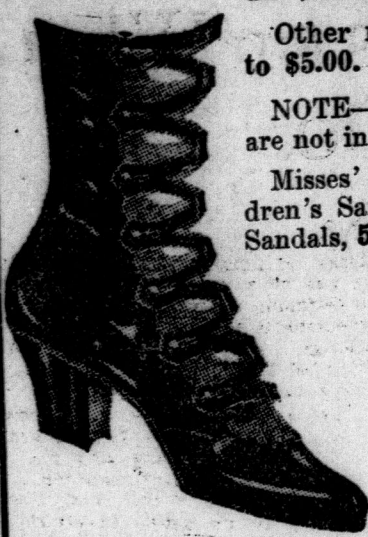

COMPLIMENTS WILSON

Says a Jingo at White House Would Have Plunged Country into War.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.—"If we had had a jingo in the White House," said former President Taft in an address at

the commencement of Bryn Mawr College, today, "this country would now be at war with Germany."
"Instead," Mr. Taft said, "our chief executive is a man who appreciates his responsibility and realizes that, considering the temper of the people, a turn of his hand would plunge us into an international conflict."

DR. THOS. MANNING ELECTED PRESIDENT LONDON CONFERENCE

Rev. D. N. McCamus Is Runner-Up, and May Be Next Choice.

ST. MARYS, June 3.—Rev. Dr. Thomas Manning, pastor of Central Methodist Church, Stratford, was elected president of the London conference in succession to Rev. G. N. Hazen, London, at this afternoon's session and Rev. A. E. M. Thomson, Aylmer, was made secretary. Rev. D. N. McCamus, London, received the next highest vote to Dr. Manning in the balloting for president, and as it is regular that the runner up succeed to the presidency for the next conference, Rev. D. N. McCamus will likely have this honor in 1916.

Theological Students in War.
Rev. Dr. Smythe, principal of Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, addressed the conference this afternoon and made a report on the work that institution had done during the past year. Students, representative of nine Methodist conferences throughout Canada to the number of 92, had been in attendance. This was the greatest number since the college first began its work. Seven students had volunteered for active service with the Canadian contingents.

London Helps Education.
Rev. Dr. W. H. Graham, secretary of education for the Methodist Church in Canada, made a splendid appeal for higher educational ideals among the people at large. London conference, he said, had gone beyond last year in its giving for educational work in the church. Sixty per cent. of the total amount received for educational purposes was used in assisting probationers in college, the rest being devoted to college sustenance. He made a strong appeal for more assistance for Victoria College.

Christianity and the War.
The Kaiser and the German army was roundly condemned and the speaker insisted that Jesus Christ was the great power in the world today and not militarism or Prussianism. At all their works. He pleaded with his hearers to give Christ the first place in the educational scheme of things and sought aid.

Congratulation for King.
As today was the birthday of King George, upon recommendation of Rev. H. S. Douglass, of St. Thomas, which London conference and to have this forwarded to the King by cable, after this had been unanimously passed the conference members sang "God Save the King."

PLANS TO PERPETUATE NAMES OF THE FALLEN

Geographic Board of Canada Names Rivers After British Columbia Heroes.

OTTAWA, June 3.—Names of Canadian soldiers who have fallen at the front are being perpetuated by the Geographic Board of Canada. The north fork of the Fraser River, in British Columbia, has been renamed McGregor River, and creeks draining into it, J. J. Creek, Herick Creek and Captain Creek, in memory of Capt. J. Herick McGregor, 15th Battalion, killed at Ypres April 25.

The late Lieut. D. P. Bell-Irving's name is given to the north forks of the Naas River, in British Columbia. He was a Vancouver man who fell early in the Canadian fighting.
The name of Pte. Philip Norton, a British Columbia man killed at Ypres April 24, is bestowed on a tributary of the Nation River in that province. It will be known as Philip Creek.

TOBACCO GROWERS WILL SEND TOBACCO

RIDGETOWN, June 3.—The patriotic women of Ridgetown and vicinity shipped yesterday to the Red Cross headquarters, at Toronto, to be forwarded to the soldiers at the front, 2 barrels and a box containing jams, jellies, maple sugar and maple syrup and a quantity of fruit cakes, also a bale containing 106 pairs of socks, 37 dozen handkerchiefs, 13 hospital shirts, 4 pairs of wristlets, 4 pieces linen and 1 flannel sheet.

MESSAGE TO SISTER, BROTHER IS WOUNDED.

GUELPH, June 3.—Miss Bolton, of 13 Glasgow street, has received the following wire from Ottawa:
"Sincerely regret to inform you that 2489, Pte. Walter Mitchell Bolton, Lord Strathcona Horse, officially reported wounded."
It was just yesterday that Miss Bolton received a letter from Walter Bolton, written in France, telling his sister that he was well and had seen a number of the Guelph boys who were with the first contingent. He enlisted at Edmonton, having left this city after learning the jewelry business with Savage & Co.

WALKERTON SOLDIER HOME ON SICK LEAVE.

WALKERTON, June 3.—Findlay Russell, son of Robt. Russell, arrived on the late train from Shorncliffe Hospital on a three-months' sick leave. At the opening of the war Russell was in the West with the Saskatchewan Horse and went to Europe with the first contingent. He has been in the hospital for some time and will return on his convalescence. As Russell has not visited his parents for seven years, his unexpected visit was quite a surprise and will be much appreciated.

PTE. GEORGE IS THIRD PAISLEY MAN HIT.

PAISLEY, June 3.—Mr. and Mrs. T. H. George have been officially advised that their son, Pte. Thomas, has been wounded. He enlisted in Winnipeg and was with the 18th Battalion.
Pte. Archibald McNeill, of the 48th Highlanders, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. McNeill, of Southampton, and formerly of Paisley, is reported wounded.
Pte. John McLeod, also a Paisley boy, of the renowned Princess Patricia Regiment, reported wounded at the battle of Langemarck, is slowly recovering in a hospital in France.

CONSCRIPTION FOR ALL

Mrs. Pankhurst Would Have It Apply to Men and Women.
LONDON, June 3.—There was adopted at a mass meeting held in London this afternoon, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, a resolution reading as follows:
"That we men and women here assembled ask the Government to establish obligatory war service for both men and women."
Mrs. Pankhurst declared that at least half a million German women were engaged in making munitions of war, and she urged all British men and women to register themselves at Government agencies for such service as they were fitted to perform.

NOT A MURDER VERDICT

Coroner Sees No Sense in Such Finding on Zeppelin Victims.
LONDON, June 3.—Contrary to the precedent set by other British coroners in dealing with the victims of German air raids, the Lusitania disaster, etc., a coroner sitting this afternoon at the third inquest held in connection with the recent Zeppelin air raid over London, declared he could not see that anything was gained by returning a verdict of murder. Consequently he instructed the jury to find "the deceased died from bombs dropped by hostile air craft."

HOW HE WON THE D. C.

Drake Went to Aid of Comrade With Bullet in Side.
MONTREAL, June 3.—Stretchers-bearer Reginald Harry Drake, who has been granted the D. C. medal, writing his parents here of the exploit for which he has been honored by the King, says: "Pte. George Poole Soady, of the 14th Battalion, had been 'bowled over' by a German sniper, and fell

about a hundred yards in front of the position where I was writing a letter to a friend in Montreal."
The stretcher-bearer, accompanied by a companion named Gould, started out to bring him in, and both were hit with a bullet in his side. Drake went out and gave Soady first aid before he would consent to have his own wounds attended to. The brave effort to rescue Soady was futile, for he succumbed shortly after.
Drake is nineteen years of age.

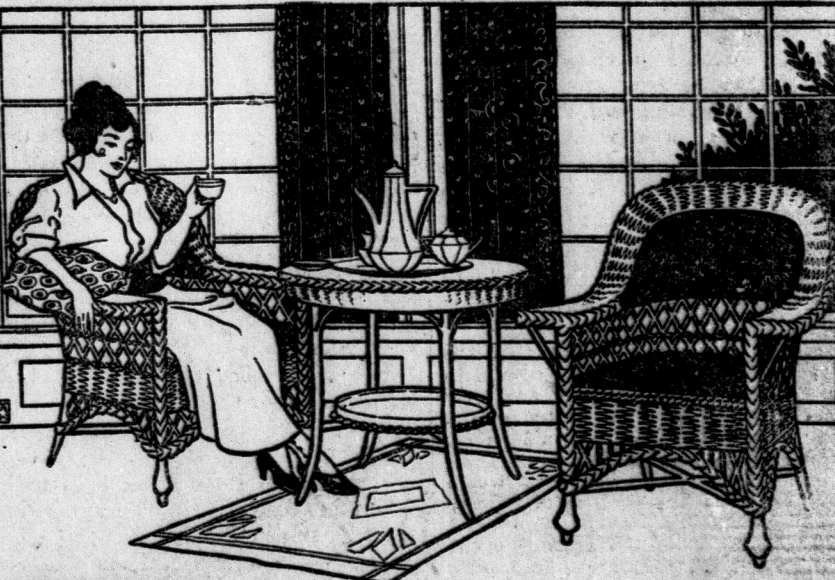
