EBBETTS STARTED MOVE

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—A proposal to boycott Class AA and Class A minor league baseball games, in so far as the purchase of their players was concerned, was made at the annual National League meeting today by Charles H. Ebbetts, owner of the Brooklyn Club. Other league officials were said to have favored the idea after discussing "prohibitive" prices asked by the minors for star performers, and suggested that the matter be placed before the joint major leagues meeting Thursday.

"We thought at first," said one club owner, "that we could fix a limit price to be paid by majors for minor league players, but decided that this would not help matters."

To Schedule Meeting.

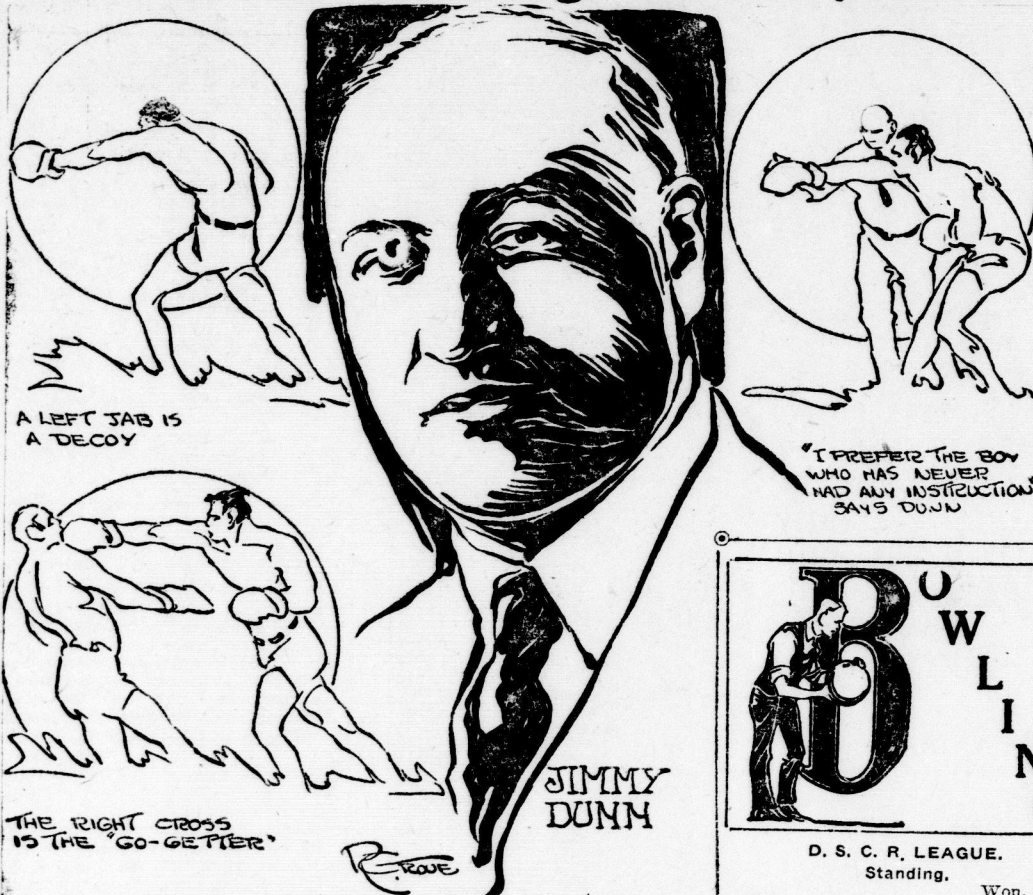

learning the great value of balance, the question of developing a right cross enters into the proposition.

There are really only two great punches in the boxing game, a left jab and right cross.

Left Jab is the Rudder.

The left jab is the rudder, it guides the way, and opens up the possibilities for the right cross. Seldom will a fighter knocked out through the medium of a left jab. The right cross to the point of the jaw is the sleep producer.

However, the left jab is invariably the means of making an opponent an easy mark for the right cross. The left jab the decoy, the right cross is "go-getter."

There have been a lot of great fighters, some of them champions, who could "box" the springer, the intellectual giants, yet brains is a most valuable asset.

When a fighter develops a good left and right hand, but lacks the brains to make the greatest use of his power. There is where the fellow with brains is the advantage. A manager can instruct his boxers in the art, but he cannot think for them in the ring.

It is after the fight starts that the value of brains makes itself apparent. If a boxer discovers that his opponent has a good left hand, he must use his right to counteract it. If his opponent is noted for a right cross, he must offset its value with a snappy left jab.

The champion boxer is the fellow who uses the weapon that will produce results.

Brains is greatly to be desired. Courage is most essential. Brains are valuable. All three, however, are soon rendered void, unless the boxer has good habits.

GET HIGH PRICES
AT CHICAGO SALEBuyers From All Parts of the
World Attend Horse
Auction.

Chicago, Dec. 14.—(Canadian Press).—Horses sold by the Chicago Horse Sale Company yesterday brought a greater aggregate amount than any previous sale ever conducted by the organization, officials announced last night. One hundred and thirty head of horses brought a total of \$53,470. Exilla Silk, a Nebraska yearling, owned by the Midway Stock Farm, was purchased by A. S. Rodney of Readville, Mass., for \$2,450, said to be a record price for a yearling at a Chicago sale.

The noted sire, General Watts, 17 years old, was sold for \$7,000, said to be the highest price ever paid for a sire of his age. The purchaser was F. G. Warden of Des Moines, Ia.

Buyers from 22 states and two provinces of Canada as well as other foreign countries, are attending the sale. Twenty-two head of horses have been auctioned off to European buyers.

Canadian buyers last night bought four horses, South Dakota Maid, Flaxey Eergen and William H., being auctioned off to L. O. Chasworth of Wheatley, Ont., while Earl Brooks was sold to W. J. Harvey of Saskatoon, Sask.

The sale will close tonight with the auction of saddle horses.

WAIVER PRICE RAISED

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Officials of the International League adopted a 168-game schedule opening April 19 and closing Sept. 23, at their meeting here today. Opening games will be played at Newark, Baltimore, Jersey City and Reading.

A suggestion that the four northern teams be permitted to train for one week prior to the opening of the season in parks of the southern teams was adopted.

The price of waivers was increased from \$1,000 to \$2,000, and a rule was adopted, which will prohibit the withdrawal of waivers, once they have been asked for.
