

CALL BIG TENNIS MEETING FRIDAY

"Pep" Gathering Should Sped Up Progress of Club.

The newly-formed London Tennis Club is holding a mass meeting of non-enthusiasts at the chambers of commerce on Friday night at 8 o'clock. While subscriptions are coming in and the club has a sizeable amount in the treasury with which to swing the big project, the meeting Friday night will be a nature of a "pep" affair, as well as laying additional solid plans for making the club a reality. Plans for eight courts to start with, a clubhouse on a site already approved, to be ready for play next season, show the energy with which the new club has conducted its affairs thus far.

London is one of the few cities in the country lacking a city tennis club, and to those who regard the project merely in the light of an investment, the officials point out in their prospectus that many clubs are paying large dividends, and all are self-maintaining.

BASKET BALL QUIZ by Referee

CHOICE. How is the choice of baskets determined? It is always customary, or the visiting team to have the choice of baskets in the first half. In the second half, the team changes baskets, so there is really no advantage.

SUBSTITUTE. When a substitute goes into the game what normally must he go through? He must report to the scorers and be recognized by the referee. He cannot communicate with any player until play has been resumed.

DEAD BALL. If in making a throw the basket the ball becomes lodged in the supports, how must the ball be put in play, under the basket or in the center circle? The ball shall be put in play in the center circle.

BLOCKING. What is blocking? Blocking is impeding the progress of an opponent who has not the ball.

FOULS. What is the difference between a technical foul and a personal foul? A technical foul does not involve personal contact, while a personal foul is committed when a player holds, blocks, trips, pushes or indulges in any other form of unnecessary roughness.

REMOVAL. In what cases can the referee remove a player from the game? If a player makes four personal fouls he is automatically removed from the game. The referee simply points to the foul sign which the fourth personal foul is committed by the same player. He can also be elected from the game for a disqualifying foul.

CHURCH LEAGUERS READY

Bar O. H. A. Players—Are Held Up Schedule by Rink Problem.

Despite the fact that they are held up by the question of rink accommodation, and therefore cannot get their schedule drawn up, the Church Leaguers at their meeting last night cleared up everything else in connection with their plans for the winter series. Four churches, Crown Memorial being an exception, have applied on Monday night, have been placed on the waiting list, and the league will operate eight teams, divided up into two groups. The schedule will be so arranged that in one night two games from one group will be staged, the other group getting one game. The next night the order will be reversed.

O. H. A. players were barred from the league last night. All the teams handed in their lists of eligible players and these will be gone over by the executive. The league will commence a sale of season tickets to go at a nominal sum, as soon as clearance is secured from the L. A. A., now starting a campaign for its treasury funds.

MOTION AIMED AT J. DUNN'S CLUB LOST

New York, Dec. 12.—A proposal made by the Rochester club that any player in the International League of two years' standing, for whom an offer of \$15,000 or more has been made, must be sold, was rejected today at the closing session of the league's annual meeting. The proposal was aimed at the Baltimore club, which for four years has won the pennant and which has been top-heavy with star players, according to proponents of the motion. The vote was 7 to 2, with one club not voting.
