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MANY BILLS BEING RUSHED THROUGH

Local Legislature Getting Along to the End of its Work-May Finish Next Week.

GAME LAW AMENDED.

FREDERICTON, April 14.—The house met at 10.30 a. m. The following bills were read a third time. To make better provision for the sale of taxidermy, respecting life and accident insurance, to amend the general hunting act to authorize the cancellation of certain grants, to authorize exemption from taxation of the Maritime Steamship Company, to incorporate the New Brunswick Ducks and Pheasants, Limited, to incorporate the Woodstock Masonic Lodge.

A number of bills were read for a second time. Hon. Mr. Ormiston introduced a bill to amend the game laws. It was, he said, to consolidate the various acts of the province referring to game and forest protection and to introduce a few changes to overcome difficulties which he had experienced under the present law. Among the changes would be one making any moose a half mile if it is three years old and had horns with three points not less than four inches long. The office of game commissioner was abolished and the work vested in the chief game warden. Game seasons or licenses would be extended from 1910 to the 1st of July, 1912. Mousers, which were now unlicensed, except in a few countries, would be protected throughout the province except from the 11th of March until the 10th of May. Part of the moose would not be allowed to be sold in open market during the next three years, although this would not prevent a resident taking part of for his own use. The act would also prevent the buying of part of a moose in cold storage. The meeting was a most important one and the Campbellton Board of Trade is adopting the proper course in handling this delegation. While the plans of sketches of what is required at the L. C. R. terminals here would require the expenditure of much money, the necessity of making a start in the right way and add improvements from time to time, and provide for the future growth of Campbellton, Campbellton's trade is growing rapidly and in a few years the present facilities will be insufficient for our needs.
