## MANY BILLS BEING RUSHED THROUGH

Local Legislature Getting Along to the End of its Work-May Finish Next Week.

### GAME LAW AMENDED.

FREDERICTON April 14.—The House met at 10.30 a. m. The following bills were read a third time. To make better provision for the sale of testators; respecting life and accident insurance; to amend the general mining act to authorize the cancellation of certain grants; to authorize exemption from taxation of the Maritime Steamship Company; to incorporate the New Brunswick Dock and Terminal, Limited; to incorporate the Woodstock Masonic Lodge.

A number of bills were read for a second time. Hon. Mr. Giffmer introduced a bill to amend the game law. It was, he said, to consolidate the various acts of the province referring to game and forest protection and to introduce a few changes to overcome difficulties which he had experienced under the present law. Among the changes would be one making any moose a year until it is three years old and had horns with three points not less than four inches long. The office of game commissioner was abolished and the work vested in the chief game warden. Chase season or better could be extended from 1910 to the 1st of July, 1912. Muskrats, which were now unprotected, except in a few counties, would be protected throughout the province except from the 11th of March until the 10th of May. Part of the bill would not be allowed to be sold in open market during the next three years, although this would not prevent a resident taking part of the game in his own use. The act would also prevent the killing of part of the game in cold storage. ## DELEGATES CHOSEN TO INTERVENE THE DOMINION GOVT

Will Likely Leave For Ottawa A Week From Saturday—Important Matters to Be Presented to Railway Department.

### CAMPBELLTON'S FUTURE.

An important meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held in the Council Chamber Wednesday evening. A large number of members being in attendance.

The committee appointed at a previous meeting to prepare accurate plans of what was considered feasible in the way of improvements at the I. C. R. yards here, presented a very exhaustive and accurate report, which was fully discussed and the recommendations finally agreed to.

The following delegates were named to go to Ottawa to lay the matter before the railway department: D. Mur-

ray, M. D. Mayor, Dr. Plunkett, Wm. Glover, A. E. D. McKinnon and Edward Alexander, Messrs. Alex. McLennan and John McLean were appointed alternates.

The matter of having overhead railway crossings made at one or two places in town was discussed and it was decided to press this matter also. A committee was appointed to draft up a proper memorial which will be given to the delegates to present, embodying the needs of Campbellton.

The meeting was a most important one and the Campbellton Board of Trade is adopting the proper course in sending this delegation. While the plans of sketches of what is required at the I. C. R. terminals here would require the expenditure of much money the idea is to impress upon the department the necessity of making a start in the right way and add improvements from time to time and provide for the future growth of Campbellton.

Campbellton's trade is growing rapidly and in a few years the present facilities will be insufficient for our needs.

## TWO MEN INJURED IN RAILWAY WRECK AT CAUSAPSCAL

Another serious wreck occurred near Causapscal early this morning when the Maritime express No. 34, due here at 4.45 was derailed.

The train was proceeding at a lively rate, when without warning the train left the track, and smashed things up considerably.

## SENLAC WILL RUN ON BAY CHALEUR

Will Complete With Canada in Campbellton-Gaspe Route.

### START IN MAY.

The St. John Telegraph says:—The steamer Senlac, under the management of Wm. Thomson & Co. and formerly on the south shore of Nova Scotia route, will go on the Gaspe-Campbellton route in the early part of May.

This announcement was made last night by Percy W. Thomson of the firm. The steamer Canada at present has the government subsidy for this route, but Mr. Thomson said last night that as the result of many assurances received from Campbellton people he felt that there was room for the Sen-

lac in competition with the Canada, as he felt the former was a superior boat. The Senlac is at present receiving her spring overhauling.

The Senlac is a good boat and will make an active competitor for the trade of this route. The Thomson Co. are practical men and people and understand the requirements of the travelling people. It is likely that the Senlac will make two trips to Gaspe, leaving this end of the route on Monday morning, but this has not been definitely settled.
